

Western Powers Report Progress

BIRKENHEAD, England (Reuters)—Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd said Friday night the Western allies have made "considerable progress" toward agreeing on how to handle negotiations with Russia.

In a speech prepared for a political meeting here Lloyd said he and Prime Minister Macmillan formed the impression during their Moscow visit last month that Russia wants to negotiate.

"That is also the wish of the West," he said.

Britain's main purpose in foreign affairs, Lloyd added, is to seek the renunciation of force and of unilateral action as a means of settling international disputes.

Speaking of Western consultations for the forthcoming East-West talks in Geneva, Lloyd said: "Of course, free partners do not agree with one another on every single point of emphasis or details of tactics. AGREE ON ESSENTIALS

"That we are agreed upon the essential and will continue to be agreed there is in my view no doubt whatever."

He added: "Considerable progress has been made toward agreement on how to handle ne-

Wayne-Schuster Get New Contract

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian comedy team of Johnny Wayne and Frank Schuster has been signed to another 12-show, 12-month contract with Ed Sullivan on a United States television network. The new series will start in September.

Their current contract with Sullivan ends with a show July 31.

"It's a real break," Wayne said Friday. "We've been offered our own show at terrific money on an American network, but we turned it down."

Neither partner would say how much money the new contract means for them, but Wayne said it represented a "substantial increase" over the \$176,000 figure for the present contract.

Foreign Trade Prospects Concern Finance Minister

OTTAWA (CP)—Finance Minister Fleming expressed fear Thursday night that a possible rise in European tariffs may tend to split the North Atlantic alliance.

"In seeking wider trade opportunities wherever we can, we shall continue to employ all available facilities including those of GATT, the one organization which brings together the important trading countries and the chief trading groups."

The Common Market, now in operation, is designed to build up gradually a tariff-free area to increase the flow of goods across national boundaries. It is made up of France, West Germany, Italy and the three Benelux countries.

Mr. Fleming added: "Despite these difficulties and uncertainties in the commercial policies of the Common Market countries, world trade and payments have been moving into better balance."

... The United Kingdom and Western European countries have added over \$3,000,000,000 to their gold and dollar reserves last year and this trend is expected to continue. For this reason alone, we are entitled to expect that trading opportunities in that direction should continue to improve.

Turning to the U.S., he suggested Americans become "less timid" about imports, particularly those from Canada which buys more from Americans than it sells and is linked with the U.S. in bonds of continental defence.

"In particular the actions of the U.S. in imposing during the last year new import restrictions on lead and zinc and mandatory controls on petroleum have aroused strong resentment in this country."

Lama Arrival Is Unexpected

TEZPUR, India (Reuters)—The Dalai Lama Friday arrived unexpectedly at Bomdila two days ahead of schedule, reliable sources reported here Friday night.

The 23-year-old spiritual ruler of Tibet was not expected in that village in northeastern India until Sunday. He left Sang Dzong this morning and was due to stop en route to the 7,140-foot-high mountain community.

At Bomdila, the Dalai Lama was expected to be met by an Indian government envoy carrying a personal message from Prime Minister Nehru, who granted him asylum after Chinese Communist troops poured in to fight an anti-Communist revolt in his mountain republic.

The Dalai Lama is expected to go on to Tezpur—the first major railroad in the Assam region—after a few days rest in Bomdila.

Budget Means Higher Prices

TORONTO (CP)—Manufacturers indicated today that a one-per-cent increase in general sales tax will be passed on to the consumer in the form of higher prices for a wide range of manufactured goods.

The tax increase was announced Thursday in the federal budget.

President G. I. Wilcox of Canadian Westinghouse Limited said: "The increase in sales tax must be passed on to the consumer because of the inability of industry to absorb the extra cost of doing business."

He applauded the government's effort to reduce the budget deficit but added: "To place an added tax burden on an industry which is struggling to be competitive with the rest of the world behind one of the world's lowest tariff barriers can't be in the national interest."
