A SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.—A unusually sad drowning accident occurred on Friday morning, about 11 o'clock, in Ward's Brook, some seven miles from St. John, on the Loch Lomond Road. Two sons of Coroner John Jordan, named respectively Arthur W. and LeBaron B., and aged about 21 and 18, left their father's home in Simonds to take a bath in a small stream in the neighborhood, known as Ward's Brook. LeBaron, the youngest, had been at the brook bathing several times previously this season, and took his brother to a place where he had found the water comparatively shallow. He was the first to go in the stream, and had not been long in when he got beyond his depth and sank beneath the surface. Arthur made a rush into the pool immediately to save his brother's life. Neither it appears could swim. The older brother soon found himself over his head and struggled to get ashore again. Both young men were then in such a position that one could not help the other, but somehow LeBaron found bottom and turned around to look for his brother. He saw him rise to the top but so far away that he could not reach him. The unfortunate young man remained but a moment on the surface and then sunk, and was not seen again.—St. John Telegraph.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Afghan Russian Difficulty Again.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 27. The Marquis of Salisbury has renewed the proposal that Russia should withdraw her troops from the advanced position held in Zulficar Pass in order to avoid a possible conflict with the Afghans.

Russia agrees to the proposal on condition that the Afghans be restrained from occupying the positions evacuated by the Russian troops. Such an occupation will be an immediate sign for a Russian advance.

Military activity at Odessa is maintained. It is rumored that preparations are being made for an early movement towards the Caspian Sea.

Crossing the British Channel in a Row Boat.

LONDON, July 26. Oxford crew started from Dover at 10.15 o'clock this morning to row across the Channel to Calais. The weather at the time of the start was fine and there was a dead calm. The crew expected to reach Calais at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. A great crowd of persons witnessed the starting of the boat. At 10.30 the boat was one mile out, but at 10.45 it was making slow progress as the tide was causing it to drift.

LATEST.

LONDON, July 27. The Oxford crew, during their passage across the Channel, shipped several seas, and had to bail their boat frequently. When within seven miles of the French shore two of the crew gave out, owing to the heat and exertion, and were compelled to rest. The others were game to the finish.

John Bright's Speech at Spencer's Banquet.

LONDON, July 27. The Irish party are furious over John Bright's remarks at Earl Spencer's banquet. Several of the party propose to demand the Speaker of the House of Commons attention to Bright's speech as a breach of privilege. This feeling is taken as marking a still wider divergence, growing into the actual enmity, between the liberals and nationalists.

The Medical Relief Bill.

LONDON, July 26. If the House of Lords refuse to adopt the Liberal amendment to the Medical Relief Bill, the majority in the House of Commons will not allow the bill to drop, but will insist upon the necessity of Parliament dealing with the measure as an integral part of the electoral reform.

Disaster at an Excursion.

CHATHAM, ENG., July 27. While an excursion steamer was loading with passengers yesterday, the pier collapsed throwing eighty persons into the water. The majority of them were women and children. Many were drowned and others were injured and exhausted before rescued.

Cholera in Spain.

MADRID, July 26. There has been a slight increase in the number of cases of cholera in the densely populated poor districts, where hygienic measures are impossible, owing to the stubborn resistance of the inhabitants.

The New Egyptian Loan.

LONDON, July 27. The final arrangements were made yesterday between the Foreign Office and Rothschild and Bleheroder, of Berlin, to issue the New Egyptian Loan.

Obituary.

HALIFAX, July 27. Capt. Sinclair, formerly of the American Navy, but for years a resident of this city, representing the Lancaster Insurance Co., died yesterday.

Severe Fire in Paris.

PARIS, July 26. The Batignolles quarter of this city was visited by a severe fire last evening. The loss is several millions of francs.

N. W. Troubles and the Pulpit.

HALIFAX, July 27. In nearly all city pulpits yesterday sermons were preached referring to the late rebellion.

Return of the Sharpshooters.

OTTAWA, July 27. The Sharpshooters met with splendid reception on their arrival home from the front.

The Master of the "Ulunda" Speaks.

SIR,—Referring to a paragraph in your issue of 16th inst., which has this morning come under my notice, I beg to say that I was not aware there was to be any race between the steamers Carroll and Ulunda last trip, from here to Port Hawkesbury, as stated by you. They may have been laboring under that impression; but notwithstanding she left ahead, I found no difficulty in passing her under easy steam, when only two hours out, but owing to a dense fog in the Gulf, we arrived about the same time.

From Halifax to Boston I may be permitted to say, the Carroll left Halifax three hours and forty minutes before us, and arrived in Boston one hour and thirty-five minutes after. This shows which steamer makes the best time. This statement can be corroborated by the passengers on board either steamer.

A Startling Variation.

The minister at a recent meeting came very near being broken up right in the midst of the ceremony, and all by the bride, a pretty, fragile, young little thing, and one of his favorite parishioners. So there are some very young brides of awful nerve, and that pastor probably feels as if one such had carried the whip-hand with him. If ever trouble does arise in that nest, the minister must expect his share of the blame.

It is announced that the Canadian Pacific Railway company has decided to push on the southwestern branch from Manitou, some seventy miles, to the vicinity of Oak Lake, forthwith. Profiles of the work are now being prepared, and in a very short time the grading of the whole distance will be let in small contracts in order to ensure hasty completion. The C. P. R. will themselves do all the bridging, of which in the first nineteen miles there are some five thousand feet, and over the same section the earth work involves over half a million yards. This extension will be completed and in operation in time to move this season's crop. Besides this, some thirty miles will be built of the Manitoba Southwestern to Treherne. The announcement has given great satisfaction to the people of Manitoba, and the effect of the construction of the road will be to promote greatly the immigration into the southern parts of the province.

Emigration from Great Britain continues to decline, although the falling off is not so marked as last year. In June 19,930 persons left the kingdom to seek their fortunes in other lands, as against 21,876 in the corresponding month last year, and of these 12,908 went to the United States, 3,370 to Australasia, and 2,652 to Canada. Compared with last year Australia has gained 821 emigrants over June, 1884; the United States gets 1,081 less, and Canada 1,669 less, the falling off in our case being undoubtedly due to the troubles in the Northwest. In the past six months Great Britain lost 106,434 of her population, or 22,430 less than in the corresponding period of the preceding year. Of these Canada obtained 10,949, or nearly 9,000 fewer than in the same months in 1884; the United States attracted 73,093, or 9,100 less, and Australia 17,906, or 4,500 less.

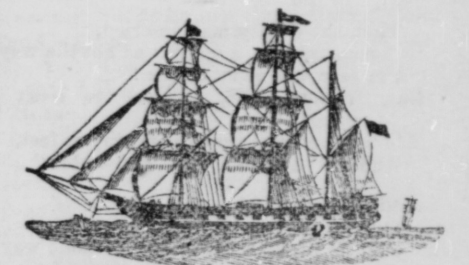
