

Ottawa-Hull Canadiens Beat Pats; Take 3-2 Lead

HULL, Que. (CP)—Ottawa-Hull Canadiens Sunday dropped Regina Pats 6-3 to take a 3-2 lead in their best-of-seven Memorial Cup hockey final.

Regina, plagued by slow starts throughout the series, opened the scoring early in the first period and led 3-2 mid-way through the second. But two quick goals while Pats' starry forward Bill Hicke was off for two successive holding penalties put the baby Habs ahead.

Terry Gray and Bill Carter each scored twice for the Junior Canadiens with Claude Richard and Ralph Backstrom scoring once each.

Joe Loughamer, Dave Balon and Art Erickson scored for Regina.

About 4,000 fans jammed the arena here to watch the thrill-packed final.

PLAY TUESDAY
The teams meet Tuesday night at neighboring Ottawa for the sixth game.

Joe Loughamer lifted a shot from close in past goalie Bruce Gamble to open the scoring at 1:07 and the Pats had the best of the first five minutes of play, keeping the puck in the Ottawa-Hull end.

But Canadiens came back with lightning-like suddenness, Carter banging in a loose puck at 12:02 and Backstrom neatly beating the Pats' defence for a quick goal at 15:26.

Pats evened the score at 16:33. Balon scored after Gordon Berenson passed to him from behind

the net.

Pats, pressing throughout the second period, seized in command of the game when Erickson scored at 11:08 to give them a 3-2 lead. It was Regina's last goal.

Claude Richard tied the score at 17:01 on a pass from Bill Carter after Hicke went off for holding at 15:55.

Hicke was penalized again at 17:22. Gray put Ottawa-Hull ahead 4-3 at 18:17 and he scored the clincher just nine seconds later.

Tim Tam Grabs Kentucky Derby

CHURCHILL DOWNS, Ky. (AP)—The fabulous Calumet Farm did it again Saturday, winning its seventh Kentucky Derby as Tim Tam charged victoriously through the muddy stretch to finish a half length in front of a 45-to-1 shot, Lincoln Road, ridden by Canadian-born Chris Rogers. Noureddin was third.

California's Silky Sullivan gave his best, but it was not enough. Silky treated the crowd of some 100,000 with his usual late rush, but tired and staggered home 12th in the field of 14 three-year-olds, all carrying 126 pounds.

With a substitute jockey, Ismael Valenzuela, in the saddle for Willie Hartack, out with a broken leg, Tim Tam never faltered as he overhauled the pace-

setting Lincoln Road in the final sixteenth of a mile of the 1 1/4-mile run for the roses. Noureddin, owned by the Crabgrass Stables, was a half length behind Lincoln Road.

Lincoln Road, from Isaac Blumberg's Sunny Blue Farm, almost stole the Florida Derby from Tim Tam at odds of 75 to 1 at Gulfstream Park March 29. Saturday he gave the Calumet backers another case of jitters before Tim Tam snatched North America's greatest racing classic.

BANDITRY IN MIND
Leading from soon after the start, Lincoln Road and jockey Rogers, a native of Hamilton, Ont., both with highway banditry in mind, looked for a time as if they might make it stick in the mud.

But, Tim Tam came chugging home in the late stages and won by the same margin as he did in the Florida Derby.

Bettors wagered \$1,638,520 on the Derby.

Winner Is Announced In Southern Kings Raven Shoot

Mr. Arthur Clements, Montague, was declared winner of the Southern Kings Fish and Game "raven shoot" with 132 pair of raven's feet at the regular monthly meeting held at Cardigan on Friday night.

The meeting was presided over by the president, Mrs. Louis

Cantelo. Business items of the association were dealt with, and following this, a discussion took place on what action the association should take towards assisting with the erection of the two dams at Moore's sanctuary which were recently washed out. \$50.00 was voted as immediate assistance, but it was felt that some action should be taken to have the local Federal or Governments take over the site as a national park or as camping and picnic area for the pleasure of Islanders and tourists, providing it should meet with the approval of Mr. Moore. One of the members stated that "this is the greatest tourist attraction on P.E.I. and should be further developed."

A committee consisting of five members was appointed to look into this matter, as well as bring in recommendations re a causeway to replace the present Cardigan bridge, which would not deter the passage of fish upstream.

It was also decided to hold a special meeting in the near future at which a fisheries expert would be present, to advise the association on the pros and cons of a causeway, and the necessary precautions to protect the fish.

Portuguese Macau, covering six square miles on the China coast, was Europe's earliest foothold in mainland China.

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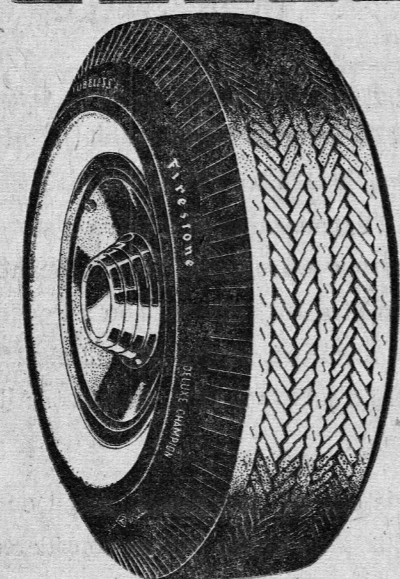
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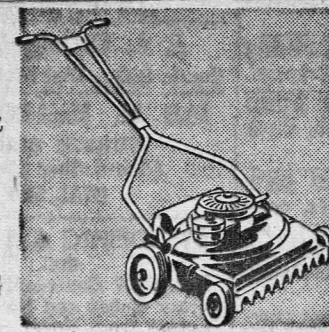
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
