rates discriminated against the daily newspapers as compared with the weekly newspapers and magazines, which enjoyed a lower rate. The Postmaster-General said there was a deficit in his department created by the present rates, for the handling of daily newspapers, weekly newspapers and magazines, and that to help offset the deficit his department had to collect \$2,000,000 more from news-papers and magazines. One million dollars of this amount must come from the daily newspapers. "The committee stated that from the time of Confederation it had been recognized that daily newspapers should be available to all Canadians who desire to read them.

"The substantial increase in rates contemplated by the bill would have to be passed on to rural subscribers who were the only ones affected, placing dailies in some instances at least beyond the reach of the rural readers.

"It was further pointed out that the daily newspapers were the most important medium for the dissemination of news often of great vital interest to the entire nation.

"At the meeting, a suggestion was made that some slight decrease or readjustment in the post rates might be effected but when the committee made its report to the subsequent meeting of the C. D. N. A. (held Monday afternoon) ... this suggestion was rejected." The Monday afternoon meeting reaffirmed its stand and instructed the committee to write the Postmaster-General expressing the C. D. N. A. views, the statement continued.

Inquest Held Into Death Of Georgetown Boy

Injured in an automobile accident at High Bank on Sunday, four-year-old Aiden Jenkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hibbit Jenkins of Georgetown died in Montague Hospital yesterday morning.

A coroner's jury later in the day found that the boy had died as a result of injuries received in the accident, and that the driver of the automobile, Sheldon Ross, with the Canadian Army at Halifax, was "entirely blameless."

The inquest was held at the R. C. M. P. office, Montague, with coroner Dr. G. S. A. Inman presiding.

The boy was a passenger in an automobile, driven by Mr. Ross, which was proceeding to the ferry at Wood Islands on Monday. When at High Bank the right front wheel came off and the car skidded into a ditch. The boy received injuries to his head and was taken to the King's County Memorial Hospital at Montague.

The other occupants of the car were Mrs. Jenkins and Miss Margaret Lavers, Georgetown, both of whom received facial lacerations; the driver's son, Peter, who was unhurt; and Mrs. Jenkins' two-year-old son Ralph who is still a patient at Montague Hospital.

Dr. Lorne Bonnell, Murray River, was the first witness yesterday. He said he had been called to the scene of the accident and had treated the patient there. He also treated him later at the hospital. In his opinion the child died of intercranial hemorrhage.

The driver of the car, Sheldon Ross, Halifax, said he was an uncle of the child. He had been visiting relatives in Georgetown over the week-end and had been returning to Halifax at the time of the accident.

Sometime before the accident he smelled something burning and stopped to investigate. He found nothing and drove on. At a rough section in the road the right front wheel came off and the car skidded into a ditch.

Cpl. Doug George, R. C. M. P., stated that the threads on the right axle were worn off, and also that the cotter pin was worn off which held the axle nut in place. The nut was found inside the grease cup, and also a portion of the key was found there. The bottom inside portion of the

Egg and Poultry Marketing Report

Production of eggs on Prince Edward Island shows a further seasonal decline this week, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, District Inspector, Poultry Products. Quality remains good with demand strong from other Maritime points. Producers are receiving for ungraded eggs, delivered AL 53-4, AM 51-2, AP & B 42, C 30-1. Dealers are quoting station operators for graded pack, delivered AL 60-1, AM 58-9, AP 48-50, B 48-50, C 36-38, and quoting this pack to retailers at AL 63-4, AM 61-2, AP 51-3, B 50-3, C 38-40. Eggs retelling to consumers, in cartons AL 66-7, AM 67-9, AP 63, Grade B (loose) 58-9, Grade C (loose) 45.

Poultry receipts continue light and consist mainly of fowl and a few broilers. Dealers are quoting for chicken, live, over 5 lbs. 41, dressed, over 5 lbs. Special 47, A 46, B 42, C 26. Fowl, live, over 5 lbs., 35, Dressed, over 5 lbs., A 39, B 37, C 20.
