Truman Over-Rules Wage Decision By Board, Gives Coal Miners Pay Boost

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—President Truman today overruled the Wage Stabilization Board and approved a \$1.90 daily wage boost for John L. Lewis' 375,000 soft coal miners. The President's decision, reached one week ago, was announced by Economic Stabilizer Roger Putnam who said: "This is not the decision I would have recommended." But Putnam told reporters he would not resign over the disagreement in handling the case and he was certain that at least three of four public members of the Wage Board would also stay on the job.

Judgment Reserved In Murder Appeal

OTTAWA, Dec. 3 (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada today reserved judgment on an appeal of Mrs. Arthur Pitre of Quebec from a murder conviction arising out of a 1949 time-bombing of a commercial airliner. Mrs. Pitre, one of three persons convicted of murder following the crash of the plane with a loss of 23 lives, was due to be hanged Oct. 17. The execution was postponed to Jan. 9 to permit an appeal to the Supreme Court.

Chief Justice Thibodeau Rinfret said the court will attempt to give judgment "as soon as possible." Mr. H. Barry Bugden from the City was here on Wednesday, November 26th on business. A short time ago he was here as director of the show "Up She Goes."
