## CONSERVATIVES IN CHAMPLAIN

TRIUMPH OVER HUMAN DEVICES.

Dr. Marcotte Elected by a Good Majority

THREE RIVERS, April 8.—Mr. Tarte's missionaries have been defeated, and Dr. Marcotte is the elect of Champlain by a good majority. With all the returns in except from Rat River, which gave the Conservatives a majority of sixteen in June, and St. Maurice, which gave four of a majority to the same party, Dr. Marcotte leads by 153. This, considering the tremendous efforts made by Mr. Tarte and his friends, is a splendid victory.

## NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Davin Dubs the Government a Cabinet of Bandits—Instructions to Outsiders.

OTTAWA, April 8.—In the House of Commons yesterday afternoon the Government were effectively accused of giving an important intimation to the interested outsiders before parliament had been informed.

The evening session was given to Cowan's Alien Labor Bill which is mostly a reprint of the one that the conservative whip, Mr. Taylor, has four times introduced and supported in the last seven years, and has now before the House of Commons.

Mr. Davin was disposed to reflect on Mr. Cowan for stealing the measure from the man who did the pioneer work on it, but excused him on the ground that he was following the cabinet of bandits who had placed on their banner the phrase, "We glory in purloined policies." Both bills go to a special committee to be amalgamated.

HALIFAX, April 8.—The four-masted steamer Assaye, of the Beaver Line was wrecked yesterday on Blood Rock, off Seal Island. The steamer struck in a fog.

## THE PORTE'S DECISION.

Playing into the Hands of the Powers.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 8.—The Porte has decided to request the Powers to hasten the appointment of a Governor of Crete and thus put an end to the present situation in that territory.

## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

London, April 6.—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada took place today. Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, the chairman, presided. He referred to the disastrous effect of bicycles, of which, he said, 10,000 were used in Toronto alone. The chairman expressed the belief that the prospects of the Grand Trunk railway was favorable. The retiring board was re-elected.

Chicago, April 6.—The mayoralty election resulted in a decisive victory for the democratic party, its candidate, Carter Harrison, having more votes than all the other candidates combined.

London, April 6.—Owing to shorter supplies of cattle and an improved demand, the tone of the market was stronger and prices advanced 1/4c. to 1/2c. per lb. as compared with last week. Trade was good, and choice States sold at 11 1/2c. and Argentines at 11 1/4c. In sheep the feeling was decidedly stronger, and prices are 1c. to 1 1/2c. per lb. higher than last week, choice selling at 13c. A private cable from Liverpool quoted choice Canadian steers firm at 11 1/2c., and noted an advance of 1/4c. per lb. for middling stock at 10 1/2c. to 11c.

## LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

WEDNESDAY, April 7.

House met at 4.45. Mr. Shaw asked the Leader of the Government to table a statement showing in detail how the sum of \$429,17, as shown in the Auditor's Report for 1896 and charged to Crown Prosecutions in Magistrates' Courts, has been expended, the names of the persons to whom paid, the amount paid to each person, and the services rendered by each person, for such payment respectively.

Hon. Mr. Peters said he would furnish the details asked for as soon as they could be prepared.

House adjourned until 3 p.m. on Thursday.

—Sir Charles Tupper's attention was, a day or two ago, drawn to the statement, published in certain Liberal papers, that he was anxious to expedite the business of the session in order that he might attend the Diamond Jubilee celebration in London, and he was asked what foundation there was for it. "All I have to say," observed Sir Charles, "is that the statement is entirely contrary to the fact. It is quite possible that urgent private business may compel me to go to England for a short time after the House rises, but I shall regret very much if that is the case, because I have nothing to do in any way with the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee in London. I am quite satisfied that the representation of Canada is in very good hands, and that Mr. Laurier requires no assistance from any source. I should greatly prefer to be on this side of the Atlantic at the time. My anxiety to see the business of the House expedited as far as possible is due solely to my wish that nothing should prevent Mr. Laurier representing Canada in England on that important occasion. I see no reason to prevent the necessary business of the House being brought to a satisfactory termination in ample time to enable Mr. Laurier to go to England at the time specified. So far as I am concerned I am disposed to facilitate that in every possible way."
