ROYAL TOUR OF NIGERIA PLANNED

May Extend Visit Later

LONDON, (Reuters)—The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh will visit Nigeria from the end of January until the middle of February next year, it was announced at Buckingham Palace Tuesday night.

It will be the first visit to Nigeria by a reigning British sovereign.

The announcement added that the Queen hopes to visit other British territories in West Africa later.

The journey, in both directions, will probably be made by air. There are two international airports in Nigeria, at Lagos and Kano.

No detailed program for the visit has yet been fixed but the Queen and duke plan to spend three or four days at Lagos, the capital, and some time in each of the regions of the colony.

The last royal visit to Nigeria was in April, 1925 when the Duke of Windsor, the Prince of Wales, spent several days there during a tour of British West African colonies.

Ottawa Has Gloomy View Of Geneva Conference

OTTAWA (CP)—The capital takes a gloomy view of prospects for the Big Four foreign ministers conference starting Thursday at Geneva.

Informants said Tuesday they see little hope of the Russians accepting German reunification even with the West offering to enter a mutual security arrangement with the U. S. S. R. and its major satellites.

They added, however, that it is difficult to be positive about the conference's outcome and recalled how the Russians agreed suddenly this year to withdrawal from Austria.

Canada has been mentioned as a member of a 15-country mutual security pact together with Britain, the United States, France, Italy, Belgium, a reunited Germany, The Netherlands, and Luxembourg on the NATO side and Russia, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania.

Canada is not committed to participate in any such pact, being put forward to sound out the Russians. The important points are the nature of the guarantees involved and the fact that the U. S. would be a member of any such arrangement.

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One of the chief objectives of External Affairs Minister Pearson during his recent visit to Russia was to try to convince the Soviets that a reunited Germany led to a European security agreement would be a better guarantee of safety for Russia than a Germany left to wheel freely in the centre of Europe.
