## CHRONICLE OF THE STORM.

### Additional News Regarding the Damage Done.

A valued correspondent at Cardigan writes: "The storm of Thursday night was the most destructive ever experienced. Cardigan bridge is completely wrecked, about sixty feet of it lying up stream. People are crossing to and fro by means of row boats. The schooner Carmena, owned by Mr. Jas. E. Macdonald, loaded with cattle and other freight for St. Pierre, was driven ashore, coming in contact with Captain Joseph Macdonald's store sending her bowsprit through into the warehouse making a hole about fifteen feet. Captain Hubley's schooner was also driven ashore. Mr. Macdonald suffers considerable loss by the beaching of the Carmena, but it is thought that the cargo will be saved. The tide here was the highest on record. It rose about five feet over the wharves and bridges and landed large timbers and debris in the field and on the roads. Nearly all the bridges in the vicinity are down, barns unroofed or blown down, and trees uprooted. Norton's wharf is also considerably damaged. Reports are coming in from all parts of the county showing considerable loss."

The wharf at Lower Montague was carried completely away, and Annandale wharf is almost completely destroyed. Cogswell Eastman's lobster factory at Brat Point, Georgetown Harbor, was nearly all destroyed, and Jenkin's factory at Lanching is badly damaged.

Several small schooners have been driven ashore at Georgetown. The Emerald is quite a wreck, having been driven high on land. The Llanur A. Douglass, which had just been loaded with potatoes and oats, is ashore but not much damaged.

Old residents of the east end of the Island declare that since the great storm of 1836 nothing has equalled the one of 1900.

The bridge at Rustico is badly damaged, and a part of West River Bridge is swept away.

Dr. Kelly's barn on St. Peter's Road was blown down.

The windmill at St. Dunstan's College was carried away.

The wharf at Pownal was very badly damaged.
