Labor discounts to cash buyers before taking stock at Young's.

The Canada Manufacturing Company of Toronto has suspended payment with \$50,000 liabilities.

The quarterly official board of the Methodist Church of Quebec has voted in favor of union.

The loss by the Royal Opera House fire, Toronto, is estimated at \$68,000. Insurers, \$15,000.

H. C. CURNEY, a missing bank accountant of Toronto, is defaulter to the amount of at least \$15,000.

A splendid lot of Fresh Pownal Bay Oysters just received at the Queen Square Dining Rooms. [Feb. 14—21n.]

In the London Masonic Lottery, \$15,000 in prizes was won by J. C. Williamson and P. M. Balfour, Ontario.

A BAZAR and Tea in aid of Funds of the Methodist Church and Sabbath School, will be held on Wednesday, March 21st. Participants in handbills. [Feb. 14—31n.]

Two cases of assault were disposed of by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. The offenders, Brogan and McCabe, from the east end, were fined one dollar and six.

CAPT. CAMERON, of the "Princess of Wales" left for Great Britain this morning, for the purpose of purchasing a freight boat to assist the present steamers of the Steam Navigation Co.

EDWARD TRICKETT, the Australian sculler, was lately defeated a week ago over the Parattata course by a rising young oarsman named Clifford. The stakes were a \$100 a side.

The London Times, in an editorial, eulogizes the career of Josiah P. Benjamin, Q.C., English mercantile lawyer. The Times says he has profited by the reception accorded Louisiana's accomplished jurist.

GET the man arrested for embezzling from the Halifax Banking Company the sums of \$5,000 and \$1,000 respectively, was arraigned before Judge Pryor on Wednesday morning for preliminary examination.

FOR HUNDRED AND FORTY-FIVE cars of freight were reported inwards and outwards at the Halifax terminus last week, including seventy-seven of English goods and fifty-five of sugar inwards. Quite a brisk business.

THE HUNTING.—A correspondent at Kensington writes:—"Messrs. Leslie, McLeod, Bowness and Sims left on Tuesday for the Was, on a fur hunting expedition. Foxes are reported numerous about O'Leary. It is expected that they will secure a large number.

TWELVE rubber factories in New Jersey, New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts, will close to-morrow by agreement, throwing 8,000 persons out of employment. The object is to compel a decline in the cost of the crude article, which is said to be controlled by cliques.

LAWRENCE CLINTON, an inmate of the Poor House, appeared at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon. He has, as often before, been annoying his fellow inmates, as well as the keeper. Clinton is insane. The authorities will have him transferred from the Poor House to the Asylum.

EXTENSIVE LAND PURCHASE.—Messrs. South, Cochran & Co., report that a wealthy syndicate in St. John, N. B., have purchased from the Canadian Northwest Land Company 32,000 acres of land for the sum of \$160,000. This purchase was effected on Monday through Mr. G. R. Pursley, a well known barrister of St. John, who has personally travelled over a great portion of the Northwest, and knows its capabilities as a wheat-growing country.—Montreal Gazette.

SLIDE THROUGH LOVE.—Miss Effie McKay, a native of Pictou county, now residing at Providence, U. S., as a domestic in the family of Mr. G. W. Millard, No. 30 Spycorn street, has been the innocent cause of a terrible tragedy. A young Englishman, named William G. Haywood, 25 years of age, who was very much enamored of her, and whom she had refused to marry, after threatening her life, and striving to carry out his threats, shot himself dead, on the 24th of last month, at the residence of her employer.

STILL another important canal is talking in Europe. By it is contemplated nothing less than the separation of England and Scotland by a waterway from the Solway Firth to the river Tyne. An engineer is at present working on the surveys, and estimates are promised for early publication. This canal would have a length of only eighty miles, or twenty miles less than the Ruez. It would, of course, afford a very convenient short cut across the country for ocean steamers. Some forty years ago a scheme of the same kind was talked of.

The debate at the Y. M. C. A. Debating Club and Literary Society last night excited considerable interest. Mr. J. J. Chappell occupied the chair. The opening speech, by A. McNeill, Esq., was forcible and argumentative. An animated discussion ensued, in which Messrs. William Kennedy, D. McKenzie, John Newson, P. R. Bowers, Paul Lea, P. McCourt of the Patriot, and D. A. McKinnon took part. It was, perhaps, the most intelligent discussion of the great question of "Free Trade vs. Protection" we have had in this city for some time. A division at the conclusion of the debate resulted in thirteen voting for Free Trade and nine for Protection. The subject for discussion next Tuesday night is, "Would Federation with the Mother Country be conducive to the welfare of the British Empire," to be opened by William Kennedy, Esq.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Address in the Senate.

OTTAWA, Feb. 14. The Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne was moved by Hon. Dr. Robe-taille, the newly appointed Senator for Bonaventure, Quebec. It was seconded by Hon. John O'Donohoe, of Toronto. Both gentlemen acquitted themselves admirably on their first appearance in the Senate. Senator Haythorne and others followed.

Collapse of a Railway Freight Shed—Many Drowned.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 14. The Railway Freight Shed in this city collapsed, many people were drowned. The cause of the disaster was the bursting of the main sewer, by the flood. The bodies are in fifty feet of water and it is impossible to rescue them. The Municipal Council have voted seventy five thousand for the relief of sufferers by the flood.

Resignation of the French Ministry.

PARIS, Feb. 14. The French Ministry have resigned, owing to the Senate's action on the Expulsion Bill. President Grevy has called on M. De Freycinet to form a new Cabinet. The latter hesitates.

Thirty Persons Drowned.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 14. By the bursting of a dam a short distance from this city, yesterday, thirty persons were drowned.

Egyptian Constitution.

LONDON, Feb. 14. The Egyptian Ministry have adopted the new constitution drawn by Lord Dufferin.

A Dead Composer.

LONDON, Feb. 14. Wagner, the composer, is dead.

Telegraph Notes.

Mace and Slade gave a four round exhibition at Madison Square Garden, New York, on the 8th, before an audience of two hundred. The performance was of the tamest nature, and failed to arouse any enthusiasm. During the evening Mace was presented with a gold headed cane.

The London Times says that Lord Dufferin, who is now in Egypt representing the British Government, has drafted a despatch enforcing the necessity of protecting the Government of Egypt against external intrigue and internal weakness until it is able to stand alone. He condemns alike the premature abandonment of responsibility and annexation.

Herr Most said to a reporter, at Philadelphia, on the 8th instant, that the Nihilist, Hartmann, had come to America, to confer with him regarding matters connected with their organization, and that the coronation of the Czar had been discussed. He added that the coronation would not take place.

A schooner was wrecked near Porta Ferry Ireland, on the 8th, and another near the Shetland Islands, Scotland. In the first instance five sailors lost their lives, and in the latter the whole crew were drowned.

The French Senate committee's report on the expulsion bill, states that, in the opinion of the committee, there is no cause for the Republic either to feel alarm or to resort to violent measures embraced in the proposed law. It would be a step on a dangerous path and one contrary to ideas on which the Republic was founded. Rumors, the report says, of conflicts or of a dissolution do not disturb the committee, which is steadfast Republican. Urgency was voted for debate on the bill on Saturday.

A telegram from Chihuahua, Mexico, says that on Sunday last, about two hundred disolute characters attacked a store belonging to Pinos Altos Mining Company. The employes resisted and Manuel Anehon, a clerk, was killed. Buchan Hepburn, principal member of the company, attempted to quiet the tumult and was shot dead. A fight ensued between the employes and ruffians, four men being killed and being summoned from the adjoining towns, authorities and citizens turned out en masse, captured five ruffians, among them Hepburn's murderer, and tried and executed them on Monday. Hepburn was wealthy and had invested much money in Chihuahua. Order was restored and the authorities are pursuing criminals in the mountains.

A Post despatch special from Parra, Ill., says that Peter New, a former resident of Parra, was, with five other men, killed on the 9th by a boiler explosion in a file factory at Taylorville, Ill., and that Henry New, nephew of Peter, is dying.

An accident occurred on the 9th in a shaft of the Seven tunnel works. Four men were killed outright, and several others will die.

The stage which left Massoula for Deer Lodge, Mountain, on the 8th, was caught in a blizzard on Flint Creek Hills. The driver lost his way and with the horses and several passengers were found frozen to death.
