## GOING ASTERN.

At the opening of the St. John Exhibition on Tuesday last, Sir Charles Tupper said:

"There was nothing in this judgment better calculated to advance and stimulate the province and its people than opportunities such as this exhibition afforded for them to meet in open competition with the best products not only of their own land but of other countries as well. Exhibitions like this strengthened and stimulated the people and directed them in the line of advance which the agricultural and every other industry of the country should take and was taking. In that way exhibitions were fraught with benefit to the whole people. But he had to confess to some surprise as he listened to the president's eulogium on this occasion of his political services. It was on rare occasions like this that were the happy spots where politicians could meet together on neutral ground and work together for the general good. In the present day, continued Sir Charles, it is absolutely necessary for all places and people to keep abreast of the times. This is an age of advancement and progress. Those rulers who do not follow such a policy will find the place where they live going astern instead of ahead."

But our rulers—our Liberal rulers—have so managed public affairs that an exhibition for this Province cannot be afforded. It is to be feared that we are in this respect at least "going astern instead of ahead."

The usual votes of thanks were passed. The minutes of the meeting were read and the meeting closed with prayer by the late President.

The ladies of Zion church kindly invited the delegates and their friends to a reception in the basement of Zion church, which was heartily enjoyed by all present. The hospitality of the ladies of Charlottetown was very much appreciated by the visiting delegates.
