ECHOES FROM THE EAST.

The young men—farmers of Rock Barra, Big Pond, Hermanville and surrounding districts, having decided to organize a farmers' club and debating society, held a meeting for that purpose on Friday the 24th inst. The meeting was a large and enthusiastic one; energetic speeches were made, and all were unanimous in declaring their belief in the excellence of an institution such as we have proposed. It would afford a rare opportunity for acquiring facilities in public speaking while the discussion of farming questions would be of much practical benefit.

The usual constitution and by-laws were adopted. Mr. Francis McInnis, Milton, was elected President; John A. McPhee, Big Pond, Vice-President, and the undersigned, Secretary. Besides these officers, several committees were nominated, including Committee on subjects, managing committee, and order committee.

The work of organizing over, impromptu debate was engaged in on the question "which is better for the farmers of this community special or mixed farming?" "The discussion was moved and opened by Mr. John A. McPhee. Would it be better, the speaker asked, for the farmers of this vicinity to produce only one class of farm products for the market, e. g. cheese, butter or bacon; or should they adhere to the system of mixed farming which at present obtains, producing for the market an assortment of the ordinary farm products. After fully explaining the question the speaker declared in favor of mixed farming.

He was followed by J. Alfred McDonald, of Hermanville, who ably championed the cause of the specialist. Other speakers were Messrs Francis McInnis, H. B. McEachern, P. D. McDonald for mixed, and J. Allan McDonald for special farming.

It was contended by those on the side of mixed farming, that the specialist, unless he possessed considerable capital, was in constant danger of financial embarrassment, either from unavoidable failure in the production of a special crop, or from sudden fall of the market price. The advocates of special farming on the other hand, held that this is the age of specialities, and that we must conform to the spirit of the times or drop out of the race. It was contended, furthermore, that special farming means concentration of effort, which, in itself, is a strong guarantee of ultimate success.

The vote taken at the close of the debate resulted in an overwhelming majority for mixed farming.

The meeting then adjourned till Friday 3rd prox., when a "question box" shall furnish material for discussion on agricultural topics. There shall also be a discussion on a subject which is receiving some attention at present in our capital.

RECENT INVENTIONS.

Coins can be securely held in packages by an improved holder, which is formed of a strip of tin rolled into a cylinder, with scalloped ends, which are bent against the end coins after the package is filled.

Water can be distilled for household use by means of an Ohio man's device, in which a kettle is placed on the fire to generate steam, which passes through a pipe in the lid to a receptacle below, condensing before it leaves the pipe.

Bottles and other glassware can be safely packed for shipping in a new crate, which has spring pressed partitions adjustably placed inside the walls to press against the sides of the fragile articles and prevent the reception of sudden shocks.

For use in examining the mouth and throat a new mirror has the frame hinged on a handle, with a screw running through the handle and engaging the ring frame to lock it in any desired position, making one glass do the work of all the glasses with fixed angle frames.

The arm, chest and back muscles can be developed by a new exercise, composed of two pieces of spring wire formed into a straight central portion, with coils at each end, the wires being then extended in a straight line and ending in handles at the outer ends, which are grasped to bend the coils.

MICA MINES OF INDIA.

The Methods of Hundreds of Years Ago Still in Use.

The mica mines of India are in the interior of the country and very inaccessible. The Abruker mine, it is stated, produces the finest mica that has ever been mined, both for lamination and color. It has been sunk about 200 feet, following the pitch of the vein, and all this mica and refuse have been raised and carried away by the natives. No machinery of any kind except drill and hammers is used in their mining operations.

The refuse and the mica are placed in baskets each holding ten pounds, the baskets being passed up from hand to hand by women, who stand in a line on ladders. The contents of the baskets are deposited at the top, and the baskets are returned down the ladder in the same manner as they went up, but by another line of women. Water is taken out of the mines by means of jugs. It is supposed that this method of operation has been carried on for many hundreds of years, except that there is more care to protect the miners.

After the crude mica is taken from the mines it is first roughly trimmed and then sorted into different grades, according to sizes and quality. It is then taken to the mica workers, who split it up and scribe out the size for it to be cut into by the shearers, the cut pieces then being cleaned, weighed and packed ready for shipment. The mica is then transported to general warehouses in baskets on the backs of bullocks and in bullock carts. In this way it is carried hundreds of miles to shipping points at a speed of about ten miles a day.

The mica can be split down to .0008 of an inch in thickness. Being both fireproof and transparent, it is very useful for many purposes in the arts, besides being an excellent insulator.—Electrical World.
