FOR CARRYING LIVE LOBSTERS.—The Yarmouth Telegram of Saturday says: "Yarmouth Arthur McGray has just had manufactured at the works of the Barrell-Johnson Iron Co. a steam pump and tanks for the purpose of carrying live lobsters to England. The tanks are four in number, 4 1/2 feet x 6 feet high. Each tank has 10 shelves constructed of wood, on which the lobsters are to be placed. The shelves are connected with pipes on the outside, through which sea water will be forced by aid of the pump. Drain valves are also fitted to each shelf to complete the circulation. The capacity of each tank is about 600 lobsters. The pump is of Paton's latest valve motion, and has a pumping capacity of 15,000 gallons an hour. It can be worked as rapidly or as slowly as desired. It is very compact and of fine action.

THE TURK. Bidding was brisk and prices high at the Emery-Pasig sale at Cleveland, O., on the 4th. The shady Side Farm colony of 100 acres, with a fine view, was sold for \$1,100.
