

Sees Atomic Energy Giving Agriculture Big Boost

GENEVA (AP) — A Swedish scientist said Monday that atomic energy can give agriculture a big lift by bringing up to date the anatomy of wheat, corn and other plants.

Prof. L. Ehrenberg told the atomic-for-peace conference that experiments on barley and other grains have shown that radiation, by inducing mutations or hereditary changes in the plant structure, can increase the yielding capacity or improve upon special characters of importance in agriculture.

The anatomy and other characteristics of most plants were "still rather old-fashioned," despite 50 years of intense breeding work. Radiation could not only induce mutations but could do it several times faster than nature works the change.

Hockey Player Drowned In Ontario Lake

HALIBURTON, Ont., (CP) — Ross Lowe, named as centre on the American Hockey League all-star team last season, was drowned in Lake Haliburton Sunday while swimming after a runaway boat.

Lowe, a standout with Springfield Indians last season, was drafted for \$15,000 by New York Rangers of the National Hockey League last June and was counted on being a big help in their rebuilding plans. The 26-year-old centre at one time previously in the NHL with Boston Bruins and Montreal Canadiens, was the second highest scorer in the AHL last season.

Police said Lowe, and an unidentified friend were using a boat as a diving board when a sudden wind caught it and pushed it away from them. Lowe started after it, collapsed from exhaustion and sank.

The six-foot-one, 180-pound player broke into pro ranks with Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League in the 1948-49 season. He played 43 games with Boston in the 1950-51 season and part of the AHL campaign with Hershey and Buffalo. He became the property of the Canadiens that season when he was traded by Boston to the Montreal Club.

In winning the year-old Miss Stewart retained the Duchess of Cornwall Gold Cup for the second successive year. She was runner-up to Barbara Romack of Sacramento, Calif., in 1953 and held the trophy previously in 1951.

Miss Stewart said she now plans to enter the United States open at Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 22.

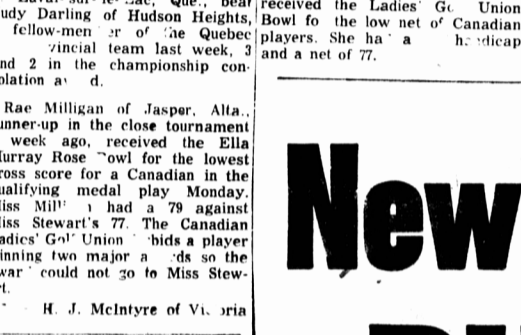

John Costello is holding the reins of "Anyway" entered by Roy Bevan and winner of second prize for Standard bred female born before 1952.



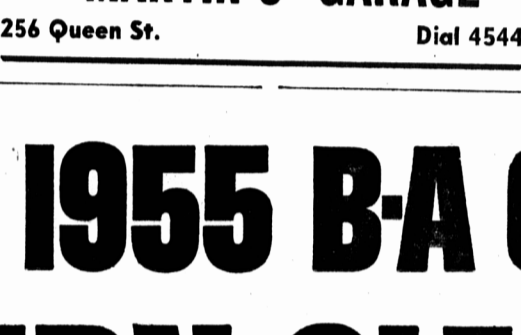

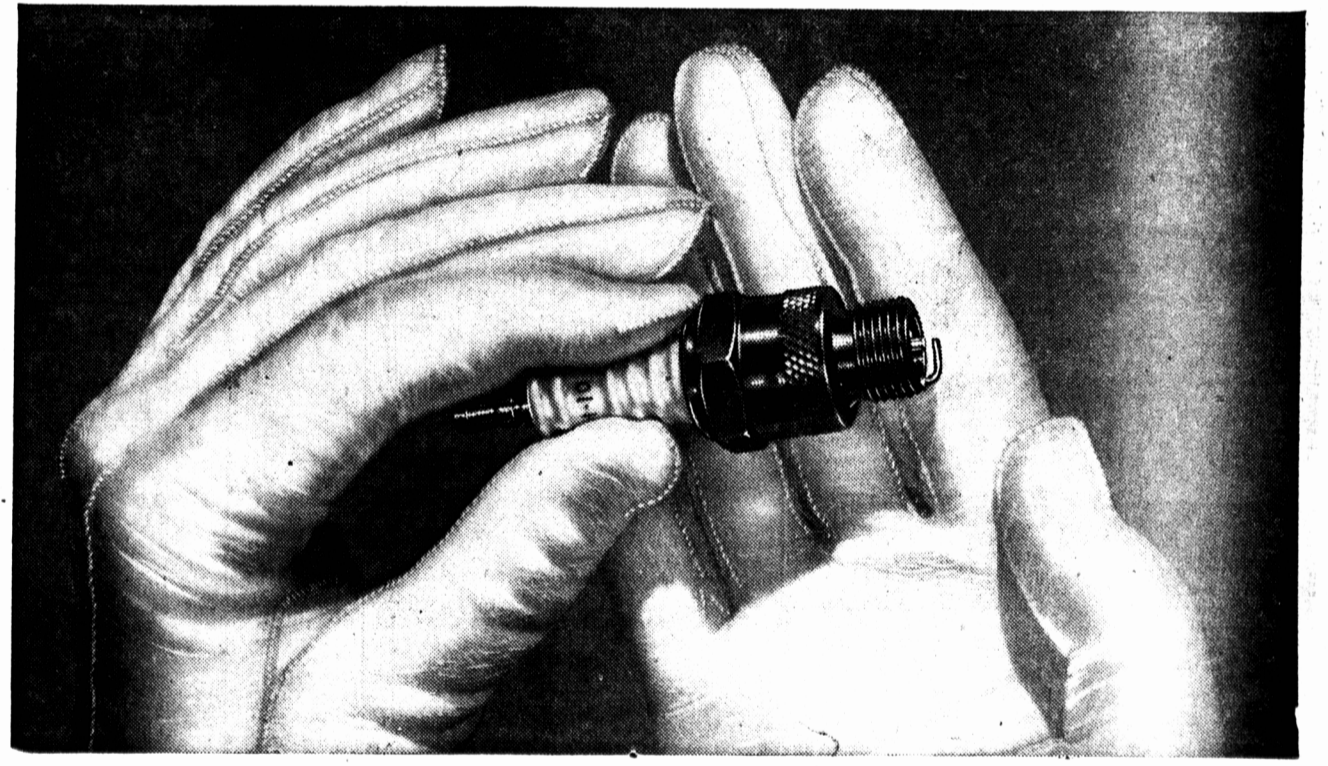

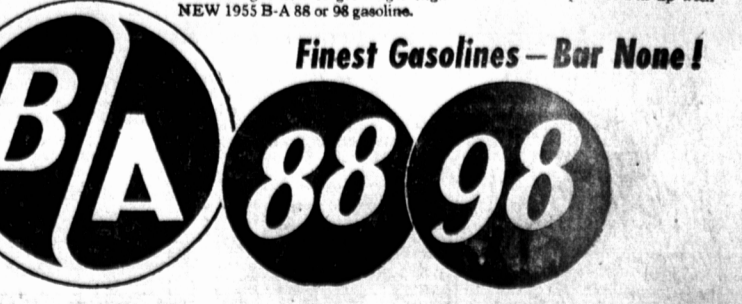
