S'ide Plans Plebiscite On Water Commission

—As a result of a resolution approved at a regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening, a plebiscite will be held at the forthcoming civic election on Tuesday, February 2nd to determine whether the Water and Sewerage Commission should be disbanded and its duties later taken over by the Town Council or whether it should remain a separate corporate body.

Councillor H. E. Clark in moving the resolution, which was seconded by Councillor Donald Lidstone, explained that the Water and Sewerage Commission had originally been set up to administer the bonds that were issued to take care of the initial cost of installing water and sewerage system in the town.
"These bonds," he said, "have now been retired and the authority for the people to decide the means for under which the Water and Sewerage Department shall be administered."

Councillor Clark, chairman of the committee on schools and parks referred to a report he had seen recently published by the council in another town. He said this report had contained a report from that committee on its specific activities during the year and he suggested that this idea might be used by future Summerside Town Councils in providing a review of each committee's efforts and accomplishments during the year.

Councillor Wm. E. Jenkins presided at the meeting in the absence of Mayor Henry Wedge who is a patient in the Charlottetown Hospital as the result of facial injuries sustained in an accident that occurred while he was exercising a horse last weekend.

Councillor Jenkins, on behalf of the councillors, expressed regret at the injuries suffered by Mayor Wedge, and joined the council in a wish for his speedy recovery. Councillors present at the meeting were William E. Jenkins, Dr. H. E. Clark, Andrew Perry, Donald E. Lidstone and Clarence Steele. The council adjourned to January 22nd when the financial statement will be presented.
