Obituary Notice

JEAN MACNUTT MATHESON On Sunday, September 13th, with a laugh on her lips and a song in her heart, there passed from the midst of her family and friends the joyous spirit of Jean MacNutt Matheson, beloved wife of Clifton Matheson. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. MacNutt and was born at Kensington, November 24th, 1901. She was twenty years of age, beautiful, vivacious and maidenly when she gave her heart to her husband for whom and for their three children she made a happy hospitable home until God called her. Her husband's work in Kensington for the first ten years of their married life. They later moved to Freetown, where Cliff was station agent till 1947, after which they moved to Water River. Her large funeral was attended by friends from all parts of the Island, and from all walks of life. Two of her former pastors flew from the mainland to pay their respect and love for one who had been such a staunch friend and support in the many trials their self denying profession entails. Though it was known by her family and closest friends, that she had a heart condition, that precluded her hope for a long life, her sudden demise while on a visit to neighbors came as a deep shock. She was active in all worthy endeavors in the W.M.S. and the W.A. societies of her church, and in such community efforts as the Women's Institute, the Red Cross and the Music Festival Association, she was ever to the front giving her support and strength without stint. Her home was the Mecca for all wayfarers; friends and strangers alike were welcomed, with friendliness that was hearty and genuine. When word of her sudden passing was learned at the church where she worshipped, the service which was being conducted at the time was immediately closed by the pastor with a short prayer. The following Sunday a prayerful silence was observed in memorial.

It is difficult to find words that will suitably and sufficiently express the feelings of the community which sustained her loss. Everyone loved Jean. She was far younger even than her few years. Her presence in a house added light, life and laughter. She loved a joke. Her religion was expressed in manifesting to the fullest, the command of Her Master whom she loved and served that "Ye love one another." She avoided ostentation in religion as in all things. She was and still is Jean whom we all love. Services were conducted by Rev. Foster Hall, assisted by Rev. Howard Christie and Rev. C. R. Webber, at her home and at the United Church, Hunter River, where her favorite hymns, "Jesus Saviour Pilot Me" and "The Lord's My Shepherd" were sung by the choir and congregation. Mr. J. B. Lewis sang as a solo, that beautiful hymn that has comforted so many bereaved and bewildered hearts "Sometime We'll Understand." At Floral Hills Memorial Gardens Jean was quietly and gently laid to rest with the blessings and prayers of the huge concourse who followed to her final earthly abode.

We have parted with her for a while. When this life, so brief when compared to the endless days of rest and peace in the limboes of Eternity, is past, those who mourn her most, her husband, her children, her sister and brother and her grand-

children, will receive a smiling welcome when they meet her in the great beyond, that will far more than compensate the grief of her passing. She leaves to mourn besides her husband, three children, Malcolm in Summerside; Ross a commercial traveller who resides at home, and Mary, Mrs. Roddy Pratt, of St. Peters and five grandchildren. Her sister Irene and closest friend, wife of Dr. Claude Simpson lives in Summerside. A brother Charles lives in Calgary, Alta. A profusion of floral tributes from friends far and near adorned the room where she rested. The pallbearers were: William McMillan, Hedy Spence, J. W. Patterson, Lemuel Craswell, Mike McKinnon and Percy Boyle. Flower bearers were: Clarence McGuigan, Everett Schurman, Allison Provan, Cuthbert Montgomery, Ivan Bowman and Reagh Bagnall.

And left us dreaming how very fair it needs must be, since she lingers there. And you - O you who the wildest yearn For the old-time step and the glad return Think of her faring on, as dear In the love of There as the love of Here: Think of her still as the same. % U.K. RESERVES DOWN ONDON (Reuters) - Britain's gold and convertible currency reserves fell by \$93,000,000 (\$260,400,000) during October, the treasury announced Tuesday. The fall was largely accounted for by the repayment of a \$250,000,000 loan to the United States export-import bank during the month. The reserves at the end of the month were \$1,080,000,000 (\$3,024,000,000).
