### Scadding Sends Sympathy to Family

HALIFAX, May 14—(C.P.)—Sitting up in a hospital bed waiting for doctors to tell when some of his toes would be amputated, Alfred Scadding tonight learned that one of the men who helped rescue him from the Moose River gold mine had been killed in the MacGregor shaft at Stellarton.

"I feel very deeply the untimely and tragic death of Joseph Campbell who so recently aided in the rescue work which saved my life at the Moose River mine," he said. "My deepest sympathy goes out to his wife and family."

Although recovering from the effects of his 10 days underground at Moose River, Scadding was still suffering from "trench feet" and most of his toes had turned black. Dr. H. K. MacDonald had to amputate some of them and had to restore circulation had failed.

### SPAIN REVIVES TUNNEL SCHEME

MADRID—Renewed interest in the Gibraltar tunnel project has brought announcement by the new Azana government that it would push completion of the long-fostered plan of a land-link between Spain and Africa. The scheme provides for twin tubes nearly 22 miles long extending under the Strait of Gibraltar to the Moroccan coast at a cost of about \$50,000,000.

### PRESBYTERY

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in regular session in Hertz Hall, Charlottetown on Tuesday, May 12th at 11 a. m. with a large and representative attendance of ministers and laymen. The Chairman, Rev. George Ayers, presided and opened the Court with a service of worship. The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Secretary, Rev. W. E. Aitken, and with minor amendments, sustained. Rev. E. R. Woodside was appointed assistant secretary and Rev. D. M. Sinclair press reporter.

MacLeod, J. R. Skinner, F. E. Boothroyd, J. W. A. Nicholson, and J. G. Hockin. Lay representatives, W. E. Brooks, D. M. Nicholson, D. E. MacLeod, J. W. F. Grigg, J. J. MacLeod, C. Leard, A. C. Duchemin, D. H. Murchison, W. N. Jenkins, Mrs. MacQuarrie and M. Carruthers.

Presbytery expressed its appreciation of Dr. Croteau's thoughtfulness in sending booklets on Adult Education to the United Church ministers in the Province. The Secretary reported Rev. Arthur Long's induction into the Montague Pastoral Charge on April 30th, at which Rev. D. M. Sinclair presided and inducted, Rev. W. E. Aitken addressed the minister and Rev. J. Stirling, the people. The following calls were received and dealt with: Mr. A. E. MacKenzie, Trinity, Charlottetown; Rev. W. A. MacQuarrie, Hunter River; Rev. D. J. Morrison, Hampton; and Rev. F. M. Young, Tryon. Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson is presenting the report of the Social Service and Evangelism committee; that Presbytery support Adult Education of a practical kind, and the formation of an adult Education League for the Province; that Presbytery support the formation of a Ministerial Credit Union within our bounds; that Presbytery urge the Temperance Federation to protest against the increased number of scripts, and press for a marked reduction; that Presbytery members cooperate in the matter of jail visitation; that the July meeting of Presbytery devote considerable time to Evangelism, and to the possibilities of Group Evangelism among our own ministers.

In reporting for the Missionary and Maintenance Fund Rev. G. A. Christie stated that there had been a slight increase in the givings of 1935 over 1934. The Tenth Anniversary Thankoffering amounted to \$1,842. Along with Halifax and Pictou Presbyteries, this Presbytery made a gain of over ten percent in its total givings over 1934. Twenty-one charges out of thirty-four registered gains. The most generous givers to the missionary work of the church are the people of Bedouque North, averaging \$15.65 per family. The next nine charges in order of givings to missions are Kensington, Summerside, Margate, Charlottetown Trinity, Princetown, Bedouque C., Alberton, Cavendish, and Belfast-Belle River.

Two candidates for the ministry, John M. Sheen, B. A. and Thomas N. Mitchell, B. A., both from Summerside, were licensed by Presbytery and recommended to Conference for ordination. W. A. Seaman, a student for the ministry, was at his request, transferred to the Hal-

Because of ill health Dr. George Ross has been obliged to resign from the Alberton Pastoral Charge. The sympathy of the Court was extended Dr. Ross and his application for superannuation forwarded to the Pension Board. Presbytery also expressed its sympathy with Rev. Alexander Pirih, Dundas, in his continued illness.

Permission was granted Rev. E. Ashley to continue work in another Conference. Rev. B. C. Salter submitted an overture to be sent on to Conference, with regard to the election of Commissioners to the General Council, to the effect that Conference elect as Commissioners the President and the three immediate past-presidents of Conference, and that the remainder be elected from the Presbytery nominations.

The report on the Presbytery Fund was referred back to the committee. Nominations for the Settlement Committee for 1937 are Rev. Arthur Organ and Rev. A. E. Ayers. Applications for Emergency grants were made in favor of Rev. W. A. Thompson, Mrs. J. W. MacKenzie, and Mrs. W. H. Spenser.

Presbytery's nominations as commissioners to the General Council are Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson and Mr. W. N. Jenkins.

Hockin, S. T. B. Home Missions Convenor, Rev. D. K. Ross, B. A. Christian Education, Rev. D. M. Sinclair, M. A. Missionary and Maintenance, Rev. G. A. Christie, M. A. Pastoral Relations, Rev. A. R. Wallis. Boundaries, W. N. Jenkins. Publications, Rev. L. W. Parker. Students, Rev. John Stirling, B. A. Statistics, Rev. T. R. Goudge, B. A. Church Property, Mr. J. M. Leard. Pensions, Rev. L. E. G.
