The Budget a Grievous Disappointment All Round

Free Trade Liberals Dissatisfied, Progressives Disgusted, Business Men Annoyed, and Everyone Taxed to the Limit. Liberal Promises as Usual a Snare and Delusion.

OTTAWA, May 24—It is roughly estimated that the new taxation proposals of Hon. W. S. Fielding will yield \$40,000,000. The sales tax which brought in about sixty millions last year is increased by fifty per cent. and should net from ninety to one hundred millions this year. The tax on bank checks and note circulation of banks should yield eight or ten millions, and will bring several millions to the country's coffers. The cigar and cigarette tax will produce five million dollars and Mr. Fielding estimates a total revenue of 333 millions on the basis of last year's taxation. The estimated expenditure is nearly 500 million. The difference will have to be borrowed and the Progressives do not conceal their disappointment with the new budget. They had become convinced that the government had no intention of yielding to their demands about the Wheat Board and the Crown's Pass agreement, but for this reason they felt all the more certain that their social tariff would be cancelled by a substantial tariff concessions, which they could carry home to the West as evidence of their pious influence at Ottawa. Now, however, they foresee themselves trekking homeward with very little to show their expectant constituents and are therefore in rather a peevish and critical mood. A Canadian farmer who buys an American made plow worth \$100 will pay \$2.50 less on customs duties, but on the other hand he will have to pay \$6 instead of \$4 by way of sales tax with the result that his actual cash saving will be only 50 cents while he must pay 50 per cent additional on all other necessities as well. Toronto's contribution to Dominion revenue will increase by \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 and in the next fiscal year Toronto's total will lie somewhere between \$60,000,000 and \$70,000,000, approximately one fifth of the \$330,000,000 which Hon. Mr. Fielding has announced to parliament as the estimated total revenue for 1922-23. General Manager and Co., Motor Company declared that the Automobile Trade Association and Automobile Manufacturers' Association would probably send a protest to Ottawa against this distinction. His own company has made a protest. The rejection of the Marks Act has caused great deal of adverse criticism in business circles. It was passed last year in the interests of revenue as well as business as a safeguard against flooding the market with German goods as these could enter and evade the tariff owing to the great depreciation of the Gornat mark. The Marks Act provided a mark should be valued at not less than 50 per cent of its face value. Now it does not matter how low its value falls, the tariff will fall with it.

"QUEEN OF SHEBA" AN ALLURING STORY

WHICH COMES TO THE STRAND MONDAY AND TUESDAY NEXT

The ancient kingdom of Sheba, ground under the usurper's heel, throned the tyrant, taking the Arab and the burning plains of Egypt. To him Sheba went, with a glittering caravan of elephants and camels decked with gold and silver and precious stones; and Solomon himself was dazzled by the treasures of the land of Sheba and the beauty of the queen. It has been the most wonderful year in the history of local hockey. The victories have been won by hard training and clean living. He was sorry that the two trophies won were not yet here for presentation, along with the watches. Dr. Yeo added his tribute of congratulations to the boys. Perhaps the Island has never received any better advertisement than that of the wonderful series of seventeen unbroken victories won by the Abegweits last winter. He would like to see the team hold together and the citizens take up the project next winter of sending the Abegweits after the Allan Cup. (Applause.)

He felt confident that this could be done. "We have the finest body of citizens in support of athletics that can be found anywhere," he said. "On many occasions when the club needed money all we had to do was to go to the citizens and ask for it. We always got it." (Applause.) As the result of an appeal to a few public spirited men the success of the coming Dominion Day sports will be helped along by the donation of twenty-four beautiful caps as prizes. He would like to see the next hockey season an A-1 coach brought down from Eastern Canada to take over the training of the boys, who certainly have already done credit to themselves and to their city.

Major Crosby U.S. Consul, was the next speaker called upon. He heartily endorsed the congratulatory remarks of the previous speakers. No team could achieve such an unbroken record of victories as the Abegweits by mere luck. It meant straight, clean playing right through from start to finish and as an athlete himself he felt his blood warm towards such a team.

Councillor Prowse congratulated the boys and expressed his regret it had not been possible to secure the Morton-Thomson trophy for presentation tonight. He read a communication from Mr. Morton referring to the matter and expressed the belief that the trophy would soon be in Charlottetown. "The Three Hospitals A Credit to Province"

Dr. McEachern of Vancouver in An Interesting Address Describes the Object of His Visit of Inspection to the Hospitals Here.

Better hospital service through closer co-operation was emphasized by Dr. McEachern of the Vancouver General Hospital at a public meeting in the Board of Trade Rooms last night. On account of several other attractions the attendance was not large, but the address of the speaker was received with very great interest by his audience, which included a number of ladies.

Dr. S. R. Jenkins presided and introduced Dr. McEachern who explained that for the present year he had undertaken the direction of the Victorian Order of Nurses. Since the war a number of health agencies have been working throughout Canada and have exhibited a marked lack of co-operation, sometimes working in opposition to each other and very often failing in their purpose. The Victorian Order asked that the speaker make a survey to determine what public health work is being carried on in Canada, what fields are not being covered, and to stimulate endeavors towards better co-operation and co-ordination. It is his intention to get the view points of provincial governments, municipal bodies and voluntary societies towards this end.

Hospital standardization does not mean having every hospital exactly alike continued Dr. McEachern, but it means a standard of service that will insure to every patient the best possible diagnosis the best treatment and the best results generally. This movement started about ten years ago by a group of Canadian and American surgeons who were impressed with the necessity of improving hospital facilities. They gathered a mass of information on the subject and after digesting this a committee of the surgeons college drafted what is known as the minimum standard requirement for a hospital. The requirements are (1) that all doctors attending the hospital should form a "chummy" group, (2) that they should meet regularly for a discussion of cases and for mutual help in their profession, (3) that these men be efficient and honest, the speaker explained that in Charlottetown dishonest practice was no doubt known but that it did exist in larger cities; (4) that the doctors form staff rules and regulations to guide hospital work; (5) that a complete medical case record of every patient in hospital be kept; (6) that laboratories be connected with each hospital for making and confirming diagnosis.

This programme was first presented to hospitals having a hundred beds or over but it is now being presented to hospitals carrying fifty beds. There has been a steady advance in the number of hospitals frantically. In 1918 out of 471 hospitals in Canada and United States only 89 were found worthy of being called "standard" but last year out of 694 hospitals 576 met the requirements. The movement has had a marked effect upon the efficiency of hospitals. Operative surgery has been reduced fifteen to twenty per cent; complications and infections have decreased; the death rate has dropped fifteen to twenty per thousand and the days stay in hospital for the average patient has been decreased from one and a half to two days. The expense of making the hospital inspections and of explaining the movement is borne by the Surgeons' College from which the movement started.

Dr. McEachern was impressed with the cordial and sympathetic spirit which the people of this province are entering into the scheme for better hospital service. He had spoken in Summerside during the morning and at the two hospitals in Charlottetown in the afternoon and everywhere a willingness to cooperate was evident. The three hospitals of the Island will be placed on the "standard" list without the slightest difficulty. They comply in every way with requirements. He inspected each of the three hospitals carefully and found that they are giving excellent service, nursing and board. The rooms are cheerful and clean and the linen spotless. All the comforts possible are being given at a charge of about one-third the charge in other provinces, and at about fifty per cent. less than the rate of an ordinary second class hotel.

The farther he had gone from the East Dr. McEachern noticed that less support to the hospitals is being given by the regularly constituted authorities—the government and municipal councils. There was no question but that the government of this province and the city councils should do more for the Island hospitals. He had heard also with very great regret that one of the finest tubercular sanatoriums in the country was allowed to be closed up in this province. In his own province of British Columbia the government and city authorities have taken a keen interest in the care of the sick, the government alone paying from 45 cents to \$1.00 per day per patient. Due to lack of sufficient support from these sources here, however, the hospitals are operated in a manner highly creditable to the province.

In conclusion Dr. McEachern wished to emphasize that the aim of the standardization movement was better hospital service to the patient. He hoped that the regularly constituted bodies and the public generally will realize more fully the necessity of supporting these institutions in this province and again congratulated the people of the province upon the three splendid hospitals. At the conclusion of his address a hearty vote of thanks, moved by Rev. Maurice MacDonald, seconded by Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh, and supported by Dr. Dewar and Mr. J. A. Webster, was tendered Dr. McEachern by the chairman. The meeting then adjourned.
