Gambetta has a premature look of old age.

Rumours of disagreements in the French cabinet are current.

Nine Land League meetings were held in Ireland yesterday.

The Kurdish invaders now occupy 3,000 square miles of Persian territory.

Rumors were afloat in Paris yesterday to the effect that the Czar was dead.

The Spanish Government will immediately disband 1,500 of the troops in Cuba.

The British Government is sending out an expedition to explore the Island of Borneo.

Official advices from Cape Town admit that the situation in Basuto land is most critical.

A cable from Rome states that Monsignor Capel has received instructions to reside in America.

The general run of sermons do more than the seven deadly sins toward keeping church pews empty.

News has been received from the west coast of Africa of the death of Choca, Governor of Whydah.

The latest news from Cabul does not support the rumor of the murder of the Ameer, and the reign of anarchy.

Three bishops for the dioceses respectively of North and Midland China and Jamaica, were consecrated at St. Paul's Cathedral in London yesterday.

The European Powers are becoming impatient at the delay in the session of Dulcigno. A despatch says it will probably take place on Monday.

The latest advices state that the Indian warfare is at an end, Sitting Bull and Rain-in-the-face being about to surrender to the United States authorities.

The Prince and Princess of Wales and the Crown Prince and Princess of Germany will attend the marriage ceremony of Prince Radolph of Austria early in February.

Despatches have been received at Paris saying that Greek agents are intriguing among the Turks, Albanians, and Montenegrins, to prevent a solution in order to irritate the Powers to resume the settlement of various questions.

Lady hussresses are very numerous in the French provinces this year. They wear a semimasculine garb of wide black trousers, reaching below the knee, where they are met by high buckskin boots. The jacket is thrown open to show the waistcoat and the felt hat is caught up on one side.

A writer points out what qualifications a point man should possess in order to be popular. He should shoot well, be able to ride on all sorts of hunters, be a good dancer, like good dinner and good wines, be fond of gossip, tell a good story, even though it be a little strong, encourage patrons and say ill-natured things about their enemies.

At the Toronto Police Court the other day occurred one of those scenes that stir the human breast. No less a person than a watch-guard over Napoleon at St. Helena, was charged with the contemptible crime of vagrancy. His name was David Brady, and he is ninety-five years of age. He is palsied, his right leg is paralyzed, he is, in fact helpless. He was one of the men who watched over Napoleon at St. Helena, and now he comes before the police magistrate charged with vagrancy. He was permitted to go as the magistrate has a respect for old soldiers. In the court he gave a history of his life. He was a midshipman on the *Bellerophon*. He was at Trafalgar, was badly wounded and got a pension. He went to St. Helena with Napoleon and was one of his guards. He was lame at the time. He produced his papers in Court and thrilled the magistrate with the signature of Napoleon. The old connecting link was let go.

In England the belief is stronger than ever that the Eastern Question has just about grown ripe for war. The Sultan's oft-repeated promise to surrender Dulcigno has not yet been fulfilled, and he declines even to discuss the subject of the Greek claims. As a consequence the British Government finds itself completely checkmated. It has been deserted by its allies. The 'Concert of Europe' has gone to pieces altogether, and England is left to deal single-handed with Turkey at her own risk and perils. The crisis is indeed very grave, and many people insist that Mr. Gladstone should summon Parliament if on Monday next Dulcigno is not surrendered. The Cabinet must choose instantly between other measures that may not prove a whit more successful and retiring definitely from the contest defeated and humiliated. At the same time it may be said that war is in a measure rendered unlikely by the strong and steadily increasing opposition which the idea of war meets in England from Mr. Gladstone's policy as well as from the Conservatives.

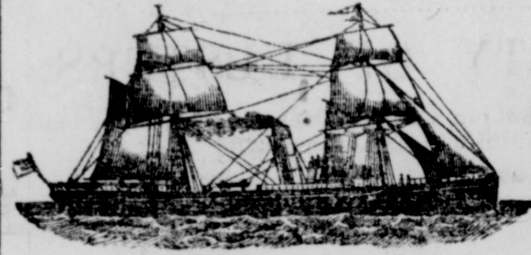

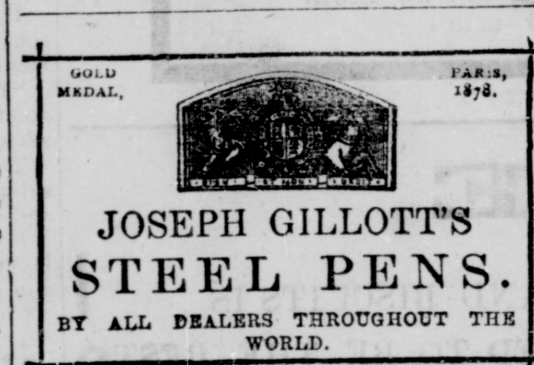
