Traffic Tips For The 14th

Barriers will be placed throughout the city one block away from the route of procession, and no cars allowed to pass through barriers except in emergency cases from 7 a.m. the morning of the 14th.

All cars going to the reception at Government House will be kept in their parking places till after 4:30 p.m. on June 14th, the time of departure of the Royal visitors.

Cars to Government House reception will travel via Kent Street entering the barriers via Pownall Street, off Fitzroy and Grafton Streets. All cars proceeding to Government House must also display stickers specially provided for the occasion.

Attention Ex-service Men

Medals are to be worn in the following order: Senior decorations first, followed by 1914-15 Star, General Service and Victory Medals, Jubilee, Coronation, Long Service or Officer's Efficiency, Foreign Decorations.

Length of ribbons: One inch showing in case of 1914-15 Star being worn (one inch of ribbon showing) other medals then to line up will show a little more than 1-2 inches of ribbon to bring all medals in line with the Star.

ROYAL VISIT JUNE 14th, 1939

No guest will be allowed to enter Government House Grounds without an official permit.

Guests driving their own cars will enter the grounds at the main entrance and park their cars in the field north of the Residence.

Guests arriving by taxi or other car not to remain on the grounds will alight on Government Pond road and the car will proceed north to Euston Street then west to Ambrose Street and then turn north.

To avoid congestion, guests arriving by motor will be permitted to pass barriers on Pownall Street from 1:45 p. m. until 2:45 p. m.

Only cars with red sticker showing will be allowed on Pownall Street. Barriers will be closed at 2:45 p. m.
