Possible 6-Team League In N.S.

WINISOR, N.S. (CP)—A new sixteen senior hockey circuit may operate in Nova Scotia this winter. Representatives of the Valley Hockey League and Truro, Bridge water and Dartmouth hockey clubs met here during the weekend and voted to form the Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League.

The Valley League is now limited to Kentville, Wolfville and Windsor clubs. Acadia University having withdrawn to concentrate on intercollegiate play.

Truro is interested because of the suspension of the old Antigonish-Pictou-Colchester League this season. The Valley teams are against operating a three team circuit.

Dartmouth spokesman said his club is "definitely interested in the league but we are going to use only homebrew players."

Truro plans will be decided at a meeting Thursday. Representatives of all six clubs will meet here again next Sunday.

The game was scheduled to be played in Truro on Sunday and the Nomads planned to meet the Bears on return from their trip to Windsor on Saturday where they announced Windsor by a 25-2 score.

The Nomads players and coach motored to Truro from Windsor on Saturday night. At nine o'clock Sunday morning they received word there would be no game.

Team officials met with Truro and the Bears officials promised to try and overcome their difficulties. At one o'clock Truro thought they might be able to play and at 2.15 they reported that permission to use the field had been granted.

The Nomads got into uniform and prepared for the kick-off at 2.45 but Truro ran into more difficulties when they realized their equipment was locked in the clubhouse and the caretaker could not be found.

The Nomads held a short practice and at 3.30 Truro sent word they were going to force the lock and obtain their equipment. The Nomads did not agree to this step since there was insufficient time for a game to be played since a start could not be made before four o'clock.

Truro agreed and wanted to concede the game but the Nomads suggested that the game be played in Charlottetown on either November 5th or 12th depending upon what arrangements could be made with Windsor.

Final arrangements on the postponed game will be completed within the next week or two.

when you aim for the middle pin, your ball rolls into the left gutter, there is only one thing to do. Aim for the right gutter. There is a danger then, of course, of the ball skipping over into the other alley, and bowling over some of your opponents' pins. This is called "Giving aid and comfort to the enemy" and is not recommended. It is worse than hitting into a triple play in baseball.

Warning — If your ball is rolling beautifully, and you are happy in the belief that it's going to tap the head pin a little to the side resulting in a strike, steel yourself against possible disappointment. The slightest deviation, we have found, will cause the ball to hit the middle pin dead center, and pass through leaving all the other pins standing. This is called "Split". It has been called other names in the first shock of disappointment, especially if there are no ladies around, but "split" seems to be the generally accepted term.

Well, sorry to leave you at a critical juncture like this, but we must bow. That's probably what you'll do also. The time for your first lesson is up, and we belong to the bowling instructors' union. Ask "The Chief" to help you out of that one, but don't expect too much. The laws are pretty lax when bowlers who have never bowled more than 100 can get instructors' licenses. If our lifetime average were not 117, we shouldn't dream of offering advice.

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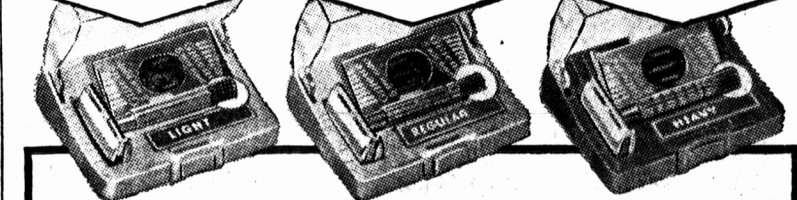
