**Address At Notre Dame By Rev. Adrian Arsenault**

On Wednesday evening, February 13th, Notre Dame Alumnae experienced one of the highlights of the Centennial Year of their friends when they and their friends were privileged to hear Rev. Adrian Arsenault of St. Dunstan's University staff lecture on Spain at Notre Dame auditorium. Preliminary to the lecture, the French section of the St. Dunstan's University Glee Club, entertained the audience with a group of delightful songs, under the direction of Father Arsenault.

The lecturer was critical of many laws the Spaniards were forced to endure, but he conceded that Generalissimo Franco, though unquestionably a dictator, had, nevertheless saved Spain from chaos.

**Convicted Of Making False Benefit Claims**

A Charlottetown resident charged with making false statements to secure unemployment insurance benefits, was found guilty in the County Court yesterday after a hearing before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet. The accused was fined \$30.00 plus court and police costs or in default 30 days in jail. He was asked to pay the fine without delay if he wished to avoid the jail term. **REFUSED NEW TRIAL**

OTTAWA (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada Monday refused a new trial for James Carey, 26, of Vancouver and fixed March 19 as the date of his execution for the murder of a Vancouver policeman. The court set aside a judgment of the British Columbia Court of Appeals granting Carey a new trial on grounds that the trial judge's charge to the jury was incorrect in law.

**Conducts Campaign From Bed In Hospital**

For the first time in this Province, perhaps anywhere, the annual March of Dimes campaign sponsored by the P.E.I. Chapter of the Polio Foundation, is being conducted from a hospital bed. Campaign manager this year is Mrs. Rose Savage, 31, the mother of three small children. Mrs. Savage a native of Abrams Village, a small community near the coast south-west of Wellington, was afflicted with polio when a very small girl, but despite her severe handicap has managed to live a normal life for the past 27 years.

In 1955 her affliction was diagnosed as the result of childhood polio, and she entered the provincial Orthopedic Centre for treatment.

**CONFINED IN CAST**  
Confined in a cast from shoulders to hips, following a spinal operation, this cheerful, undaunted woman directs the province-wide campaign designed to aid fellow victims of this dread disease. Her hospital room gives the impression of a busy city office. A telephone has been installed, a typewriter set up, and every available space is crammed with campaign literature.

From this room campaign appeals have been sent to all branches of the Women's Institute, all schools, and most of the rural business concerns. Arrangements also have been made for canvassing of business houses and residences in Charlottetown and Summerside. This year the door-to-door "Mother's March" will take place Monday evening February 18th, between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. At the present time 140 Charlottetown ladies have volunteered to carry out this part of the effort. In Summerside various women's groups will conduct this section of the campaign. \$4,000 NEEDED  
The P.E.I. Polio Chapter expects to raise \$4,000 by this year's campaign in order that equipment may be secured and facilities established for the care and treatment of those unfortunate enough to have contracted this crippling ailment.

In the campaign bulletin published by the local committee Mrs. Savage urges all who can to contribute to this worthwhile cause. "Yesterday it was they, tomorrow it may be you. Polio... strikes anywhere it pleases, any time it pleases—no one is safe... you should be prepared for it... by contributing your share."

In this work Mrs. Savage is aided by several able assistants, including, Mrs. Fred Gates, Chapter secretary; Mrs. Jennie Bloomhower, a commercial writer, and a polio victim.

**Lady Eaton Attends Girl Guide Meeting**

**Theft Wave Continues In City And Vicinity**

Although joint investigation by the Charlottetown detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Charlottetown Police resulted in the arrest of several break, entry and theft suspects earlier this week, the offense is still occurring both within and out of the city. In the City itself, there has been a break reported every night for the past three nights in addition to two in the north-western suburbs early yesterday morning.  
The R.C.M.P. report that the County Construction Ltd. garage on the Brackley Point Road was broken into early yesterday morning and an electric drill on a number of tools were stolen. The R.C.M.P. has reason to believe that there is a connection between the garage break and another break in the same area early yesterday morning in which some chickens were stolen. The electric drill, some of the tools and several of the chickens were later recovered by the Mounties yesterday. It could not be learned last night whether or not any arrests had been made but the R.C.M.P. reported yesterday evening that they intended to apprehend a suspect.  
Within the city, a break into the Imperial Life office on Queen Street on Wednesday night and one into Dr. R.H. Barret's office also on Queen Street on Tuesday night profited the robbers, at least temporarily, by several hundred dollars in both cases. In addition to this the City Police are investigating another break which occurred at the Cudmore's Dry Cleaning firm on Thursday night or early yesterday morning. In this case the thief or thieves is reported to have made off with some wearing apparel and several miscellaneous articles including a radio which was recovered with a woman's coat yesterday.

There are spots and there are spots.  
There are spots you should try to take out right away (before they 'age' and become impossible) and there are spots you should take right away to be dry cleaned (because household methods will harm the fabric or only serve to spread the stain or make it set).  
Spots from beer, soft drinks and fruit, for instance, can generally be removed right away with warm water. But if they get near an iron or remain too long they will get "tanned" and be impossible to remove.  
Grease spots should be brought in for dry cleaning right away. Taking out grease spots is a highly complex business—there are people in the dry cleaning business who make their whole living from studying the effects of different stains on different fabrics.  
The "spotter", as he is called, rates an expert's pay in the plant, and you can't duplicate his knowledge with something shaken indiscriminately out of a bottle.  
Dirty clothes should never be stored "until there's enough to take to the cleaners" and this is especially true of grease stains. Many oils oxidize and become darker colored with age. Then it's impossible to take them out.  
It's a good idea to pin a note on to the stain telling what it is, or tell us when you bring the garment in. This way the spotter doesn't have to guess and you get the full advantage of his expert knowledge of what solvent to use.
