GEN. SIMMONDS

When the threat is equalized on both sides it no longer has the same power as a deterrent to either one. "Against a force of 200 bombers, or even 100 modern bombers carrying nuclear weapons, an attrition rate of 80 or 90 per cent is practically meaningless because the devastation that will be wrought by the ten per cent that get through can utterly destroy the industrial centre of a modern industrial state," General Simmonds said.

The other alternative referred to by the speaker is what he called a balance strategy or a graduated deterrent where there are varying situations with which we may be faced. There, he said, is everything from open warfare, tactical pressure to open warfare.

"We should have the means of dealing with a great variety of situations and use only such force which may be necessary without having to plunge into the ultimate thermo-nuclear exchange.

"How do we stand in Canada in regard to this world which we are living and the strategy which is necessary to maintain the world balance?" asked General Simmonds.

"If we believe in a balanced deterrent it is essential that the nation should be able to spring to arms quickly, because NATO, which represents the strong right arm of the whole of the Western democratic defence, cannot afford to maintain in being — year in and year out — forces strong enough to do anything more than provide an immediate shield capable of very quick reinforcements."

NATIONAL UNITY

General Simmonds emphasized the importance of national unity and made reference to "the unhappy history of the past in connection with national service which has stirred up such resistance among the French speaking people in Quebec that they will not accept it. He expressed the opinion that a good deal of the trouble was caused by "bigoted English speaking Canadians who are not satisfied to accept the French speaking Canadians as he is against his cultural and spiritual background but felt that he ought to be changed from it and have a measure of service for the nation as a means of doing so.

In my experience with the French speaking Canadians who have served in the army, they are first-class and they have the right to follow their own cultural and linguistic habits if they wish," said General Simmonds, "I believe that given that...the resistance would quickly disappear."

General Simmonds, a native of England with 30 years service as a professional soldier and a Canadian Army was retired as Chief of Staff last August. He commanded the First Canadian Army and Second Canadian Corps overseas in World War Two and was appointed Chief of Canada's Staff at Ottawa in 1951.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon in thanking the speaker noted the great changes that has taken place in events over the past century. He said that it was about 90 years ago that United States made the purchase of Alaska from Russia.

"Although the United States was laughed at for purchasing what was considered a worthless piece of land if Alaska did not lie between us and Russia today" said Dr. MacKinnon.

In referring to General Simmonds' address, Dr. MacKinnon said that his remarks were most timely and should be considered very carefully by all citizens interested in the welfare of Canada. "We are fortunate indeed, to have a speaker one who combines the highest in military advice and statesmanship" he added.

NOT READY

Continuing, General Simmonds said "We are in this country and if we are going to follow and support a strategy of balanced deterrent... we must be ready to spring to arms quickly...I would think it obvious to everyone that we are not."

"I will read you a quote from the 'Ist white paper on Defence, published by the Minister of National Defence':

"Should we ever be attacked with thermo-nuclear weapons it is plain that our immediate problem would be national survival. Every one not directly involved in an urgent military response would be caught in a problem of rescue, rehabilitation and maintenance of essential services.

"Now are we in Canada ready for that situation" asked the speaker.

It may only be pointed out here that the display cases are equipped to keep the fruit and vegetables fresh and crisp while holding their flavor and freshness.

The refrigerated dairy cases contain the largest variety of cheese anywhere in Eastern Canada. Contained in the multiple decker cases are eggs, butter, shortening, lard, milk cream and soft drinks. Everything is maintained at an even temperature.

The grocery space in the store has been doubled. Greater variety of groceries are available to patrons and they are better displayed. The aisle space has been doubled in order to avoid congestion.

The modern snackbar is an additional attraction which will provide coffee, ice cream, hot dogs and milk shakes for hungry customers who want a quick bite.

Another attraction is the doughnut making machine. The Super-Market has the exclusive franchise on Prince Edward Island for Donut-flake doughnuts. The operation of the doughnut machine in itself should prove quite an attraction.

To add to the overall beauty of the store there is an attractive color scheme of pink with coral. The new fluorescent lighting system operates throughout the store.
