Saint John, and to Mr. Gardner, the Chief Architect at Ottawa, our Assessor wrote Mr. Hunter, definitely setting out an assessment, on November 17, 1952.

Reply Cited

"A reply to this letter was received on Feb. 23, 1953 from Mr. Hunter, in which he enclosed a copy from his chief, Mr. E. A. Gardner, who states 'I would advise that in accordance with the terms and conditions of the original agreement, the tenants are responsible for the payment of taxes and rates which may be levied as a result of their occupation. Where the leases have not yet been executed, the tenants have signed formal applications agreeing to pay the taxes.'"

"Mr. E. P. Murphy, Deputy Minister of Public Works, also in a letter dated July 10, 1953, states, 'The property in question was purchased as a site for a new Public Building and the buildings on the site are at present occupied by tenants who are responsible for taxes and rates which may be levied as a result of their occupation.'"

"If the contention of Mr. Gardner and Mr. Murphy and others at Ottawa is correct, then we are not eligible for a transitional grant as provided for in the Act respecting Grants to Municipalities. 'However, we feel that since we have no law for collecting taxes from anyone except the owner of the property, strict adherence to this regulation would be discriminatory against our City, and furthermore, since the property is not being used for any Crown purpose, we think that the owner should take the status of an ordinary property owner and taxpayer and should pay full taxes until such time as it is used for Crown purposes. Inquest Last Night In Truck Collision Deaths

That James Curtis, Herman Smith, and Thomas Sanphy came to their death on October 1, at Brudenell, by severe injuries to head and chest as the result of an accident between trucks owned by James Curtis and Seaman Beverages Ltd., was the finding of the coroner's jury at the inquest held at the Legion Hall, Montague, last night. The jury further recommended that the driver of the Seaman's beverage truck be exonerated from all blame. Dr. G. S. A. Inman presided as coroner, and Mr. S. S. Hessian represented the Crown.

Mr. Francis Shepherd of Cardigan, the first witness, stated that he had seen Mr. Curtis, Mr. Sanphy, Mr. Smith and Mr. Lavers in Cardigan at approximately 4:45 p.m. on October 1, and had not seen any of them again until following the accident when he saw Mr. Smith. Mr. Everett MacEachern of Charlottetown, an employee of Seaman's Beverages, stated that after completing their work in Montague they left for Charlottetown. Outside Montague it began to rain and they stopped the truck to put on the tarpaulin. They started off again slowly, and had gone about 1-4 mile when he saw a truck coming directly towards them. His truck had pulled as far off the road as possible but the truck came straight at them and struck the cab first, then the corner of the box. When they got out there were three bodies lying on the road and one in the ditch.

The next witness, Andy Wedge, driver of the Seaman truck, corroborated the evidence of the previous witness, stating that he had pulled the truck over to the side of the road as far as he could go. Following the accident, he said, two cars arrived and he sent them back to Montague for a doctor and the police. John J. MacInnes of Brudenell said that he had just arrived

Dealers Claim Coal Situation Not Unusual

Commenting on recent statements by several coal dealers regarding the unusual quantity of American soft coal reaching the Province and delays in having orders of Nova Scotia coal filled, a city dealer said yesterday that "the delay referred to was not unusual and followed a pattern which has been accepted for many years."

"The coal produced at nearby mines is not suitable for local consumption," he said "and the demand for the higher grades of Nova Scotia coal is not confined to the Island alone. The Montreal market must be supplied before navigation closes up the St. Lawrence and I understand the coal

company has every ship available moving the coal output to that market. No doubt there is some American coal coming it but none to us this year," he said.

Another dealer said that although certain types are not always available as required, he wished he could sell all the Nova Scotia coal he could roll into the city. One dealer showed concern over the slight, if any difference in delivered cost of high grade Canadian coal as compared with the imported product and emphasized the justice of preferring the Canadian coal "in the interest of our own miners and their continued employment."

This we do not admit. Protracted Delay "In June we were given definite assurance that this official would visit us in September on October 1 in reply to an urgent request that the visit be made right away, we received further assurance that he would come in the early part of 1954. We have discussed this protracted delay with Mr. Matheson, M.P., who has assured us that when he goes to Ottawa he will do all in his power to get some action.

"We bring this matter to the attention of the whole Council, as we know you would like to have this concluded during your term of office. 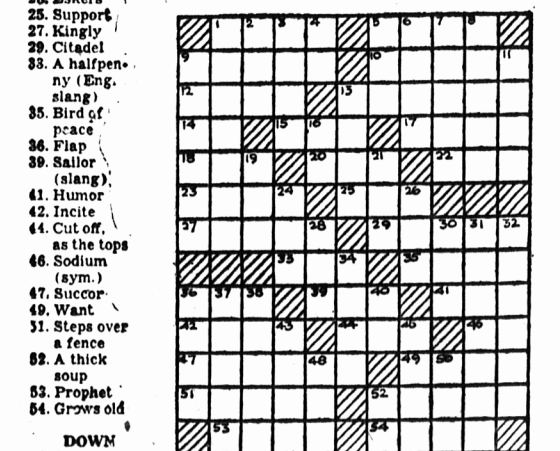
