AFTER THE STORM.

The Streets and Roads Blocked Everywhere.

The big storm is over. It raged with great fury from an early hour on Friday afternoon until about four o'clock yesterday morning.

During the storm the barometer fell to .807, the lowest recorded in the winter months for a long time.

The funeral of the late Stephen A. Carroll took place yesterday afternoon. It was to have taken place the previous day, but owing to the storm, was postponed until yesterday.

It is reported that Pictou is checked with ice. There is also a good deal of ice reported off Georgetown.
