THE ARCHITECTS' DIFFERENCE.

Sir.—As you were good enough to publish Mr. LeMay's report on my plans for the asylum perhaps you would favour me by publishing this in reply thereto.
As my plans were made in competition with others the Government outlined their requirements and of course I had to follow this or run the risk of having my plans thrown out. The requirements were as follows: (a) The building was to have no excavated basement simply a dug out corridor leading to dumb waiters; (b) it was to be connected to main building by a corridor same as present building; (c) it was to be roofed with a sharp or pitched roof; (d) the cost was not to exceed \$23,000. These are the main particulars I received from the Government.

On this basis I made my plans including the corridor connection above ground. After the plans were accepted the Government instructed me to adopt the tunnel connection in place of the corridor which I did as this seemed to have some advantages over the corridor.

It is quite right for Mr. LeMay to make reports when requested and for all I know he may be eminently qualified for the work and perhaps a clever architect as well, but when a man undertakes to criticize another's work publicly he should see that his statements are true.

1. Passing over his reference to the grade of the ground, which is all right, we come to where he speaks of "no footings under cross walls, piers, etc., but a nine inch wall resting on the ground." Mr. LeMay is evidently not an expert in reading plans as the very reverse of this is the case. Footings are shown under all walls, which with one exception, is 14in thick in basement with brick footings 24 wide. This is clearly shown on drawings.

2. A 2 1/2 inch wall does not exist in the building anywhere. The thickest wall is 19 1/2 inches, (the hollow wall) resting on a stone wall 21 inches thick with a footing of 2ft. 9 inches wide. Anyone, let alone one calling himself an architect, ought to know that this is sufficient to carry a two story structure and for that matter one of three stories.

3. Mr. LeMay is entirely wrong in regard to the bonding of the hollow wall. The partitions or cross walls bond into the inside wall which is 8 1/2 inches thick and into the outer wall at windows and into cross walls here and there to stiffen them. He ought to know, in order to have the rooms dry, that very little, if any connection should be made between the inner and outer wall, as the plastering is applied directly to the brick without furring. This is evidently much ado about nothing.

It was not intended to have the floors of the new building fair with the old one. The fresh air vents need not be below the ground. Steam, unlike water, can be driven anywhere at unequal levels, provided provision is made for carrying off the condensed steam. In the lower part, this was provided for in the specification.

If Mr. LeMay had looked carefully into

the plans he would have seen that the corridors forming the foul air ducts were completely cut off from the rest of the building, and the circulation of foul air would be simple and direct to flues. I am sure this system will give better results than the old one and at much less cost.

We also find that the roof is a pitch one and very slightly constructed, without braces ties or key posts. Well the building is only 39ft wide not much wider than an ordinary dwelling house, and the rafters 25ft long from wall plate and yet Mr. LeMay wants a king post: truss roof on it with perhaps 10x12 timbers, could not Mr. LeMay see that the attic joists tied the rafters at the bottom every 6 feet and a cellar beam half way up tied them near the centre in every pair of rafters. What are these but ties? The fact is the roof is strong and light and no extra timber will be required in its construction.

In this matter of the roof I can only come to one conclusion and that is LeMay knows but little about roof construction. Now as to Mr. LeMay's recommendation to excavate all the cellar and build corridor connection is all right. His suggestion to adopt the Mansard roof in place of the sharp roof shows that his Architecture is behind the times. The Mansard roof died, and was buried long ago. This kind of roof at its best is poor, mean looking and perishable. In regard to the fire door. LeMay ought to know that the tinned doors are far better than iron doors for fire protection. All insurance companies insist on wooden tinned doors in preference to iron doors. But then Mr. LeMay lives in Quebec.

The nine inch top story wall, condemned by him is quite sufficient for a high building. The top story of nearly all our business buildings here are but one brick thick.

The suggestion to increase the 18 inch stone wall to 24in is absurd, as the brick wall resting on it is only 13in thick. There are other points in the report that I might refer to, but as this letter is a long one I will close by asking Mr. LeMay if he can refer to any building in the city that is a model of construction and strength, and which has been carried out under his own personal supervision? Perhaps he will answer this.
