Following the ceremony His Excellency spoke to the young children regarding the dangers and difficulties they would meet in later life, and exhorted them to follow the way of a good Christian life. He charged parents to provide a Christian model on which the children might pattern themselves, saying that the moulding of these children was in their hands and their primary responsibility. During the ceremony the choir sang "Come Holy Ghost." Sponsors for the children were Mr. and Mrs. Jerome Power. Benediction was celebrated by the pastor, during which the choir sang, "O Salutaris" and "Tantum Ergo." Today His Excellency will confer confirmation at Sturgeon and Iona.

P. E. I. Presbyterian Summer Meeting

The Presbytery of P. E. I. held its summer meeting on Tuesday in St. Andrew's Church, Montague, with the Rev. F. N. Young presiding in the absence of the Moderator, Rev. G. B. Cunningham; the Clerk, Rev. T. H. B. Somers, was at the desk.

The following members of the Presbytery were also present: Rev. G. C. Webster, Rev. D. A. Campbell, Rev. Donald Nicholson, Rev. J. D. Mackay, and the Rev. E. S. Hales together with the following Elders: R. A. MacKenzie, William Whiteaway, Donald MacNevin, Geddis Douglas, J. M. MacKenzie, Oswald Graham and William E. Forbes. The Rev. J. V. Crawford, the Rev. M. C. Currie, Mr. Lee MacNaughton, Student at Belfast, Mr. J. A. Johnston, Student at Zion, and Mr. Gardiner Dalzell, Student at Breadalbane were welcomed as visitors.

The Moderator expressed the pleasure of the Court at the return of Mr. Webster after an illness of some eight months. The Clerk reported on the action of the General Assembly in granting permission to the Presbytery to receive the Rev. J. Vincent Crawford, M. A., (Trinity College, Dublin), from the Presbyterian Church of Ireland into The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and on motion, his name was added to the Roll and he was warmly welcomed to the Canadian Church.

An Interim Moderator of the Murray Harbour North and Peter's Road Charge, the Rev. F. N. Young presented a Call on their behalf to the Rev. M. C. Currie, B. A., Licentiate, and Mr. Harry Miller, Mr. Oswald Graham and other Elders spoke enthusiastically in support of it. On motion of the Clerk, the Call was sustained and placed in Mr. Currie's hands and he then intimated his acceptance of it.

The following Commissioners reported on their attendance at the General Assembly in June in Toronto: Rev. T. H. B. Somers, Rev. Donald Nicholson, Mr. J. M. MacKenzie and Mr. W. E. Forbes. Reports by interim-moderators indicated excellent work being done by supply students and ministers at Belfast, Marshfield, Brookfield, Breadalbane and Kensington.

Reporting on youth work, Mr. Campbell stated that a record number of young people were at present in attendance at Presbytery's Camp Kier and that plans were in readiness for just as splendid boys' and girls' camp to follow. The Treasurer, Mr. Somers, reported on the large number of congregations who had already paid their allocation to the Presbytery's Expense Fund—the largest at this date for some years. Following adjournment for supper, a Service of Public Worship was conducted preparatory to the Ordination of the Rev. M. C. Currie, the Rev. F. N. Young presided as Moderator and conducted Divine Service assisted by the Rev. Donald A. Campbell, the Rev. J. D. Mackay, the Rev. E. S. Hales preached the Sermon.

The Moderator then put the questions prescribed by the Church ordinances and having received satisfactory answers, the Presbytery by the laying-on of hands and prayer solemnly ordained Mr. Currie to the Holy Ministry and gave him the right hand of fellowship. The Clerk then presented the Formula which Mr. Currie signed and his name placed in the Roll of the Court. The next Stated Meeting is appointed to be held in the Church at Murray Harbour North in October, when Mr. Currie will be inducted into that Pastoral Charge.

indicated it would continue under the modified set-up. St. John Beavers, league champions, were not represented. Judge J. Elliot Hudson was re-elected president, with Chris McAlden, secretary-treasurer, and C. Roy MacDonald, Vaughan Harvey and Major Tom Rogers, vice presidents.

Bryce Love of New Glasgow, past president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, said New Glasgow should be permitted entry into the league if it posted the usual \$1,000 bond. There were no dissenting votes and formal application will be made at the league's next meeting in Charlottetown Aug. 2.

Col. Victor Oland, owner of Halifax St. Mary's, presented an 11-point proposal for reducing expenses. Some were deferred, others were thrown out, but the delegates adopted the following: 1. Limit rosters to 16 players, who would be picked from a squad of not more than 25. League winners, if approved by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, would be allowed to add two players from another club for the playoffs.

2. Limit salaries to \$3,000 for the regular schedule and a player-each be named as one of the 16 players. 3. Import not more than two referees who will work with two linesmen—an expected saving of \$15,000. 4. Require all players to pay their own fines rather than the club. The player would be billed by the league. Charlottetown opposed a proposal to shorten the 90-game schedule to 70 games on the grounds that it could not operate on less than two home games weekly. Glouce Bay was also against the move but later changed its mind. A suggestion for a player pool for the playoffs, based on a \$100 contribution per game, was deferred until the next meeting, along with a proposal that 10 per cent of a player's salary be withheld to discourage "club jumping." Transportation expenses will be discussed later. Col. Oland's modified schedule for six games weekly, three at home. Another proposal, calling for a two-week layoff during the Christmas season because of poor attendance, was deferred.

Paving Of Road Completed Paving of the Murray Harbour-Murray River highway was completed Saturday. The distance of approximately five miles was completed in a little over a week, the workmen laying about 3000 feet per day. The paving composition is the new type used in Ontario and Quebec during the past several years with admirable success. It is made by thoroughly mixing the gravel top with asphalt, after the top has been pulverized by machine to an average depth of three inches. The result is a road top well adapted to travel under varying conditions and should provide many years of excellent service.
