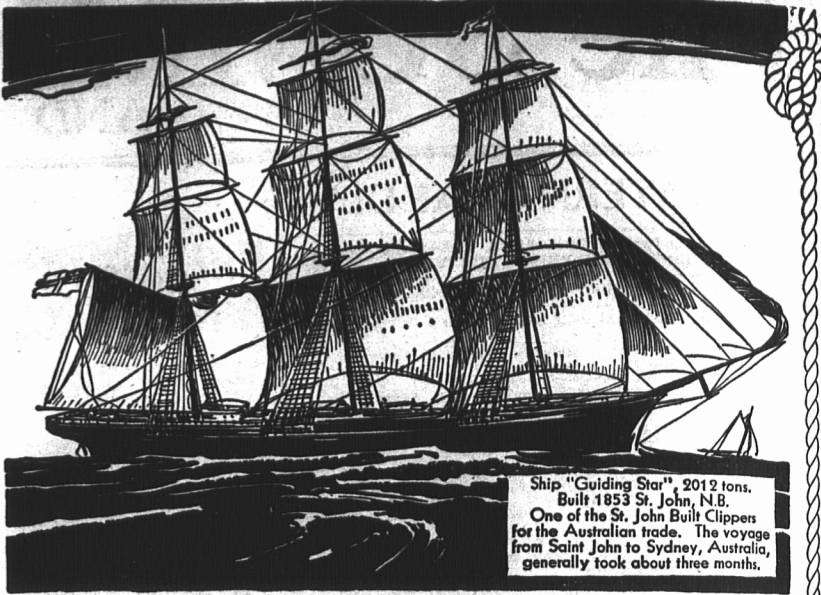
Crapaud School Reunion Picnic

MRS. ROBERT H. RAYNER

At her home in Casumpec on Wednesday, August 19th the gentle spirit of Mrs. Robert H. Rayner passed away from the scenes of earth, after about a year of failing health. As the late Mrs. Rayner was loved and respected by the whole community, a wide circle of friends and neighbors join with the family as they mourn her passing at the comparatively early age of sixty-five years.

She was always interested in every good work in the community, and was until recently President of the Women's Auxiliary of St. Luke's Anglican Church. She was also President of Casumpec Women's Institute for some time. However her chief sphere of activity was the home. There she was industrious, patient, kind and hospitable, a wise devoted mother and an efficient home maker. All her life and even in her last illness, her first thought was for the comfort of others.

Among her treasured possessions were found several poems which revealed the secret of her strength and calmness in facing the trials of life. Truly her strength came from the Lord. Selected from her collection is the following verse which so fittingly describes her own passing:

"There is no death
To those whose hearts are set
On higher things than this life doth afford
How shall their passing leave one
Who go to join their Lord."

She leaves to cherish the memory of a true mother, two daughters and two sons, Mrs. Albert Huestis, Summerside; Miss Ruth, Superintendent of Nurses at Falconwood Hospital, Charlottetown; Alton and John residing in Casumpec. Her husband predeceased her eight years ago. There are also two sisters, Mrs. Herbert Champion, Alberton and Mrs. Lester Cain, Toronto, and one brother Mr. George Webb, Wood-

stock; also six grandchildren. The funeral service held at the home was conducted by Rev. Mr. Davies of Alberton, assisted by Rev. R. B. Webb of Waterford, N. B. The hymns sung were "Peace Perfect Peace" and "Breathe on Me Breath of God." Mr. Albert Huestis sang a very beautiful solo, "Shadows" which had been a favorite with the deceased. The floral tributes were many and beautiful.

The pall bearers were Messrs. Fred Gamble, Bruce Gamble, Lyman Caseley, J. H. Bryan, Norman Oliver and William Leavitt. Interment was in the Anglican cemetery at Alberton. L-210-8-22-11.
