A NARROW ESCAPE.—A Port Neuf, Que., despatch says that five people, including Mr. Bileau, Mayor of the parish, have had a narrow escape from drowning at Point aux Trembles. They were fishing on the St. Lawrence through holes in the ice, over which was a small hut, when they were was afloat. They shouted for aid and after some time friends from the shore put out in small boats and with great difficulty brought them to land. Within a quarter of an hour afterwards the ice floe broke into pieces.

SULLIVAN AND KILRAIN.—John L. Sullivan, accompanied by several prominent sporting men from Boston and New York, arrived at Toronto on Monday. At the Rossin House they met Kilrain's representatives, W. E. Harding, of New York, and Parson Davis, of Chicago.
