Shane Dowling was an all-star running back at Colonel Gray High School but was shifted to linebacker in his Freshman season at

Blain MacPherson, an all-star on both offense and defense at Charlottetown Rural High School, was switched to center last year and did an outstanding job. He will be the center again this year and that is one position which should be solid.

Before arriving, Colin, was at the helm of the Verdun Maple Leafs of the Quebec-Ontario Junior league where he led his team to a first place 4-1 record. Our lady Panthers succumbed 3-0 to a strong UNB team in Fredericton and dropped a heartbreaking 1-0 game to Mount A in Sack-

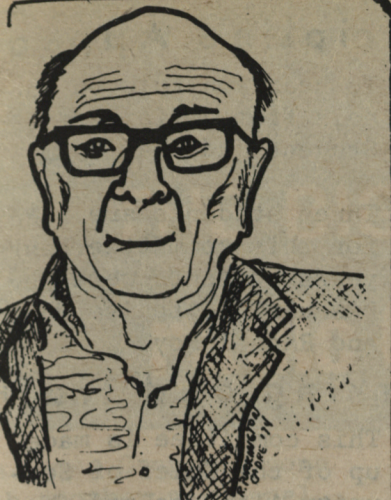
