DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 31.

The Speaker took the chair at 3 o'clock. After routine, Davies moved for the appointment of a commission to inquire into the truth of the charge made against Commissioner Hercher of tyrannical and otherwise improper conduct in the management of Northwest Mounted police.

After recess, Mr. McMullen moved the second reading of a bill to provide that no person should be appointed to civil service who has not resided in Canada for five years. Sir John McDonald said nothing had occurred to give cause for such a bill which would have a most unwholesome effect on the old country.

A couple of hours were spent in discussing an amendment to the Indian Advancement Act, proposed by Mr. Doyon. House rose at 12:05.

St. John News Jottings.

ST. JOHN, N.B., March 31.

The strike anticipated among the carpenters, painters, etc., in consequence of the determination to put the nine hour system into effect to-morrow, is not likely to take place. The master builders and planing mill proprietors met to-night and decided by a large majority to grant the demand of the men.

Mr. Burns, Inspector of the Board of Health for over thirty years, dropped dead this morning while standing in Colwell's livery stable. The Board of Trade this afternoon passed a resolution favoring penny postage for the whole British Empire.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, March 31.

Mr. Portley, M. P., for Ottawa, is dangerously ill and not expected to live.

Nuncio Baldassarri Y. Tapete, Spanish Consul-General of Canada, had an interview with Hon. Mr. Foster this morning respecting trade relations between Canada and Spain and the Spanish Colonies. It is understood he urged the Government to do all possible to extend trade, and gave the Finance Minister assurance that the Madrid Government are willing to enter into an agreement favorable to Canada.

The next term of the Supreme Court opens on May 6th. The last day for filing appeals is April 15, for depositing factum, April 19, and for inscribing appeals, April 21.

The Newfoundland Difficulty.

TORONTO, March 31.

The following special cablegram appears in the Globe:

"LONDON, G. B. March 31.—Recent despatches have brought home to the English press the gravity of the Newfoundland fisheries dispute. The subject has been much discussed during the past day or two. The Chronicle and Standard have urged the Imperial Government to try and buy out the French rights. The Times fears France would sell and simply preaches conciliation."

Motions Denied.

NEW YORK, March 31.

Judge Barrett to-day denied motions for a new trial in the Flack case, and imposed three sentences, viz: Sheriff Flack, a fine of \$500 and two months' imprisonment; on Joseph Meeks, a fine of \$500 and two months' imprisonment, and on William L. Flack a fine of \$500 and four months' imprisonment.

The United States Tariff Bill.

WASHINGTON, March 31.

At a special meeting of the Ways and Means Committee to-day, Chairman McKinley presented the Republican tariff bill. He will be allowed ten days in which to offer amendments. The bill affects a reduction of \$45,000,000 in the revenue.

Bismarck's Departure.

BERLIN, March 31.

The departure of Prince Bismarck for Frederickruehe, on Sunday, was the occasion of the greatest public ovation given in Berlin since the return of the victorious troops in 1871.
