There will be a hockey practice Sunday evening at the Charlottetown Forum for Rogers Rangers. It is slated to begin at 7.10.

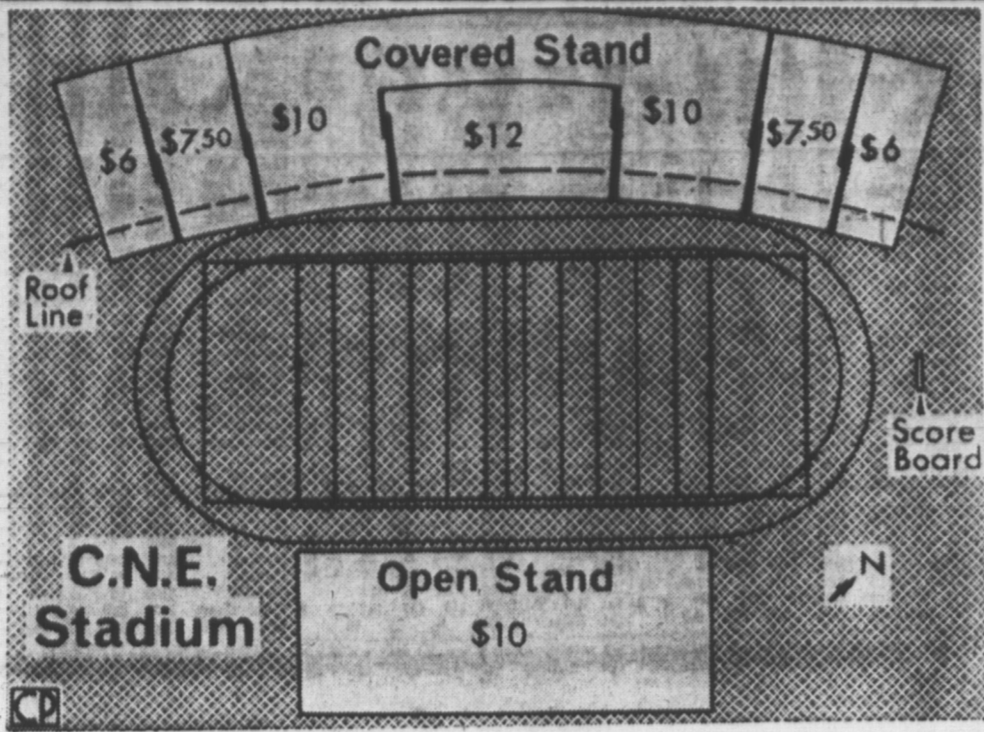

Jobless Coach 'Jungle Jim' Assaults Ian MacDonald

MONTREAL (CP)—The Star says in a sports page story that its football writer Ian MacDonald is recovering from injuries suffered in a beating in Toronto where football personalities and fans are gathering for Saturday's Grey Cup game.

The Star says MacDonald identified his assailant as Jim Trimble, deposed coach of Montreal Alouettes, and quoted Trimble in a telephone call to day to Star sports editor Harold Atkins as saying:

"I am sorry for all this. I wanted to call you. I am sincerely sorry for what happened the other day. I wanted to tell you and I would like to talk to Ian."

The Star story adds: "MacDonald with both eyes blackened, multiple bruises, rib damage and suspected kidney injuries is resting in his hotel room."

"The incident started in the Royal York Hotel, moved to the waterfront, then back to the hotel, and took place early Thursday morning between 1 and 2 a.m."

"It almost overshadowed the Grey Cup game for news value among media men."

"MacDonald explained that he exchanged his first words with Trimble in a 'hospitality suite' of the Royal York Hotel."

"SAYS SCENE WITNESSED" "Then he grabbed me by the lapels of my jacket and pushed me against the wall a couple of times. I still don't know why."

"A few moments later the two left the hotel on a short taxi ride to the waterfront."

"Montreal Star photographer Adrian Lunny saw the men leave in a taxi."

"It was at the waterfront, according to MacDonald, where a Trimble struck him several times."

"I really didn't know what was happening to me," MacDonald said.

"I couldn't understand it. I asked him (Trimble) why he was doing this. He didn't answer. He hit me again."

"According to MacDonald Trimble forced him back into the waiting taxi and the two returned to the hotel. Trimble made it clear to MacDonald that he was taking him to the suite occupied by the former Alouette coach."

"DID NOT ASK HELP" "MacDonald said: 'There were a few people with us on the elevator, but I didn't appeal to anyone for help. Maybe I should've. What I did, though, was to run off the elevator when it stopped a couple of floors below Trimble's suite. I was scared. I ran down a few flights of stairs, went through the exit door—and ran right into Trimble who had followed me by another route.'"

"It was in Trimble's suite that a major part of the beating took place."

Highlights of past Winnipeg-Hamilton clashes include: A fan standing on the sidelines at the 1957 game tripped touchdowns-bound Ray (Bibbles) Bawe of Hamilton, but Tiger-Cats whipped an injury-riddled Winnipeg Club 30-7.

For halted play in 1962 with nine minutes and 29 seconds remaining. The game was completed the next day, the first time in North America a single football playoff game took two days to play.

"He hit me and kept hitting me," said MacDonald. "When I fell he kicked me and I covered my head with my arms as best I could, but a lot of punches landed on my face, my arms and my body."

"At me point, according to MacDonald, Trimble promised to knock out all of the writer's teeth. Once MacDonald tried to crawl from the room, Trimble hauled him back."

"I kept asking him why he was doing this to me," said MacDonald. "But he would not answer, all he did was hit me. I guess he finally got tired of it after about 15 minutes of the beating. He threw me into the bathroom and pushed me up to wash the blood from my face. He warned me not to tell anyone about what had happened."

The Star says that in his telephone conversation with Atkins, Trimble was asked if he had any animosity against MacDonald. Atkins quoted Trimble as replying:

"No (referring to animosity). I really don't know. I had been with some friends. I decided to go back to the hotel and that's where it happened. I want to apologize. I would like to talk to Ian and let him know."

2 Perennial Antagonists Meet In Grey Cup Today

By BOB TRIMBEE TORONTO (CP)—Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Hamilton Tiger-Cats, almost perennial Grey Cup antagonists in recent years, clash today for the sixth time in nine years in the east-west football final.

And the clubs, which have been involved in some of the most unusual incidents in Grey Cup history, can look for the unexpected again with a downfield wind of 30 to 40 miles an hour forecast.

The game—the 38th east-west final since Toronto Argonauts defeated Edmonton Eskimos 23-0 in 1921—kick off at 1 p.m. EST. (2 p.m. AST) It will be seen by a sell-out crowd of more than 32,000 at lakefront Canadian National Exhibition stadium and by thousands more on national television networks of the CBC and CTV.

nadian football this season, all from Ticats, will make record eighth appearances in a Grey Cup game. They join the late Ches McCance of Winnipeg and Montreal: Jack Wedley of Toronto and Saskatchewan; Bert Jannone of Winnipeg and Calgary; and Mel Wilson of Calgary and Winnipeg in the record books.

Coach Bud Grant of Winnipeg seeks a record-tying fifth Grey Cup win. Low Hayman of Toronto Argonauts, Toronto RCAF Hurricanes and Montreal Alouettes, now holds the mark.

MAY EXTEND RECORDS End Hal Patterson of Tiger-Cats will try to extend his records of five Grey Cup touchdowns and four touchdowns passes caught.

Despite their recent domination of the Canadian Football League, neither the western conference Blue Bombers nor the eastern conference Tiger-Cats were expected to be finalists this year.

Grant, building around such veteran stars as quarterback Kenny Ploen, halfback Leo Lewis and linemen Herb Gray and Frank Rigney, brought his team back from a last-place finish in 1964 to be second in 1965. They went on to upset Calgary Stampede in the best-of-three WFC final.

Coach Ralph Sazio of Hamilton, whose club was a 3 1/2-point betting favorite Friday night, traded away all-star quarterback Bernie Faloney to St. front-line player to fill vacancies created by retirements.

Mid-way through the season Sazio tabbed Zuger as his No. 1 quarterback, convinced end Hal Patterson and linebacker Bobby Kuntz to come back from retirement and snared fullback Mel Anthony, a Rose Bowl star last New Year's day.

When Dick Cohee, a defensive half since coming to Hamilton in mid-1964, was inserted into the offensive backfield in the EFC final against Ottawa, the attack looked adequate for the first time this season.

While juggling his offence, Sazio relied on a rock-ribbed defensive unit—it gave up only 10.9 points a game, the best in Canada—to carry the club.
