THE AMERICANS STRUGGLING TO CAPTURE SANTIAGO.

The Enemy's Position Has Been Captured, But With Heavy Loss.

THE AMERICAN CASUALTIES ARE FIVE HUNDRED MEN KILLED AND WOUNDED.

The Battle Will Be Resumed Today, and the City Probably Captured.

GUANTANAMO, July 2.—At one o'clock yesterday, Friday, a truce after over five hours terrific fighting the Spanish began to leave their entrenchments and retreat into the city.

Many Americans were wounded. One man had both arms shot off and was wounded in the hip but was laughing.

PLAYA DELESTA, July 1.—The American forces carried the enemy's outer works and occupied them to-night.

The battle will probably be resumed at daylight.

Our loss was heavy. Some estimates say 500 killed and wounded.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—The War Department has received the following from General Shafter dated at Siboney:

"Had a very heavy engagement to-day

which lasted from 8 a. m., until sundown. We have carried their outer works and are now in possession of them.

There is now about three-quarters of a mile of open between my lines and the city.

By the morning the troops will be entrenched and considerable augmentation of the forces will be there.

General Lawton's division and General Bates' brigade have been engaged all day in carrying El Caney, which was accomplished at 4 p. m., will be in line in front of Santiago during the night.

I regret to say that our casualties will be about 400. Of these there are not many killed."
