

Anniversaries of Agony.

VICTIMS OF SNAKE POISONING TORTURED BY ITS RECURRING SYMPTOMS.

The strange case of the daughter of the Hon. A. C. Ramage, of Bellair, Ohio, who having been bitten on Aug. 19, 1875, by a copperhead snake, and her life having been saved, has had a return of the symptoms of the poisoning on the 19th of August of every year since, has attracted wide attention in the medical profession, the statement being made that the case is unprecedented in toxicological phenomena. The case of Miss Ramage, however, recalls a similar one which occurred in New York and which finally resulted as it is feared the Ohio lady's will. A young girl, who afterward became the wife of Col. George Smith, the first representative of Livingston County, in the Assembly, was bitten in the ankle by a rattlesnake in 1803. Her life was saved, but on the recurrence, year after year, of the day on which she had been bitten, her ankle and leg would become swollen as they had when the poison was first injected, and she would suffer all the tortures that followed the passing of the virus into her blood. This would last several hours, and then gradually pass away to return with unvarying regularity the next year. The violence of the paroxysms attending these recurring symptoms of the snake poisoning increased annually, but Mrs. Smith bore up under them for thirty-two years. On the next return, however, she was unable to bear through the period of the paroxysms, and died in great agony. The case of Miss Ramage is exactly the same, and it is feared that she will not be able to survive the dreaded ordeal now approaching.

Canon Wilberforce on Communion Wine.

Canon Wilberforce, in speaking in reply to the Rev. C. R. Chase, remarked that he had known terribly real and undoubted instances in which men, by partaking of wine from the sacramental cup, had been started on their downward course to a dishonored grave. If it came to a question whether the wine or the Christian should be banished from the table of the Lord, he could not hesitate a moment as to which should go. From the sacramental table, over which he had more immediate control, intoxicating wine had now long been banished, and in this he believed that they were carrying out the true spirit and meaning of the sacrament. If it was not a spiritual communion with the blessed Lord, beyond and above anything the mere elements could convey, then it failed in the great purpose for which it was ordained.—Western Morning Post.

Irish Emigration.

The Tuke Emigration Committee, during the three years it has been in existence, has assisted 9,482 persons to emigrate from Ireland and settle in the United States and the colonies, at an expenditure of £68,500, of which sum the Imperial Government contributed £44,000. The committee state that, having expended the money entrusted to them, and having largely helped by means of emigration to meet the emergency which existed, "they have decided for the present to cease their operations, while still keeping their organization in existence in view of possible future requirements."

The following is the form of ballot to be used in the election for Queen's County:—

Election for the Electoral District of Queen's County District, August 19th, 1884.

JENKINS, I. John Theophilus, Charlottetown, X County of Queen's, Physician and Surgeon.

WELSH, II. William, Charlottetown, County of Queen's, Merchant.

HOW TO MARK THE BALLOTS.

Be sure to mark your ballot for the Liberal Conservative Candidate

The elector, on receiving the ballot-paper, shall forthwith proceed into one of the compartments of the polling station, and there mark his ballot paper, making a cross with a pencil on any part of the ballot-paper within the division containing the name of the candidate for whom he intends to vote, and shall then fold up such ballot-paper, so that the initials on the back can be seen without opening it, and hand it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who shall, without unfolding it, ascertain, by examining the initials, and the number upon the counterfoil, that it is the same he furnished to the elector, and shall first detach and destroy the counterfoil, and shall then immediately, and in the presence of the elector, place the ballot-paper in the ballot-box.—Ballot Act, Sec. 45.

No voters should make any mark on the ballot-paper save one cross on any part of the ballot paper within the division containing the candidate's name for whom he intends to vote. If the voter writes his name or initials, or any remarks, he makes his ballot useless.

A simple cross upon the ballot for your candidate will assist in electing him. Any other mark or writing will contribute to their defeat.

- 1. Poll opens at nine o'clock a. m., and closes at five o'clock p. m.
2. Vote early.
3. See that your Liberal Conservative neighbor votes early also.
4. If you have a vehicle, place it at the service of your Committee to bring tardy voters to the polls. Give the information to the Secretary of Committee.
5. Do not "pair" on polling day with your Grit neighbor. Poll your own vote and let him look out for his.
6. Poll every possible vote; the loss or gain of a single vote in each sub-division may make all the difference between victory and defeat.
7. If your returning officers and deputy returning officers are Grits watch them.
8. Each Liberal Conservative should vote as though the result of the election depended upon his individual exertions.
9. Remember that any bribery, corrupt treating, hiring of vehicles, paying of voters' expenses, or any undue influence, will not only void the election, but is punishable by law.
10. Electors can only vote at one polling sub-division in the same electoral division, no matter in how many sub-divisions they may have votes.
11. Any elector's vote may be challenged who has received anything on account of his vote, or has been promised anything directly or indirectly, either to induce him to vote at the election or for loss of time, travelling expenses, hire of teams, or any other service connected therewith; or even if the said elector has directly or indirectly paid or promised anything to any person, either to induce him to vote or to refrain from voting at the election.
12. An elector having more votes than one in the same electoral district should vote in that electoral sub-division in which he resides. Attention to this rule will facilitate the polling, and possibly contribute to the individual elector's comfort.
