

Saindon Scores Four; Carver, Towers Two And Trainor One In Victory

Glace Bay coach Don Penniston, who made his first visit to Charlottetown last night, led to a four-goal scoring exhibition by winger Paul Saindon and a beautiful stick-handling exhibition by Bucko Trainor as the Islanders walloped the Miners 10-2 in an M.H.L. game.

Saindon, working in almost perfect co-ordination with centreman Buck Whitlock, winger Bob Gray, and defenseman Trainor, displayed outstanding form as he peppered Eddy D'Aoust in the Glace Bay cage continually and found the range on four occasions.

The rainy night scored three times within the first eight minutes. "Playing fine" positional hockey and skating like the wind he proved a thorn in the side of the Glace Bay defences all evening.

Islanders coach Bucko Trainor showed that he has lost none of the effectiveness that stamped him as a star with the Islanders of earlier years. He must have set a scoring record for defencesmen last night when he collected six assists and one goal for seven points.

Not since Trainor left for Newfoundland at the start of last season were the fans treated to such a smooth stick-handling act as the Islanders coach cut his way around or knifed his way through the Glace Bay team.

The Islanders scored four times in the free scoring first period and added three goals in each of the second and third sessions. Orin Carver and Merv Towers each scored twice while Elwood Ritchie and Trainor added one.

The Miners got both their counters in the opening frame with their main tilters, Tommy Fyles, pulling the trigger on both occasions. The young winger snapped both pucks home on angle shots into the corner.

The change in uniform did little to improve big Hughie Campbell's temperament on the ice. In other years while wearing a Halifax uniform Campbell's main past-time was battling Phil Vitale. Last night as a Glace Bay representative he showed a liking for Roland Pilon.

The two players collided on several occasions with pushing duels the result. No blows were struck but it wasn't the fault of the athletes who were separated rather forcefully several times by the linesmen.

Coach Bucko Trainor claims that Bessette is the best goalie in the Maritimes and Roger has just about convinced everyone in Charlottetown that he's right. He was unbeat-able after the first period last night and in all kicked out thirty shots.

Eddy D'Aoust at the other end of the rink was a busy man. At times he was hot and at times he was off color. The Islanders directed 18 shots his way and he stopped 16 of them.

Fyles, Bobby Brown and Campbell were the pick of the Glace Bay forwards. The Miners however did not resemble the same team which licked the Islanders 8-0 in the Bay on Saturday night. Penniston claims it was the Monday night game in Halifax and the

travelling while the Islanders say it was the Glace Bay ice surface.

Saindon put the Islanders ahead 4-0 seconds after the game started by scoring a goal while skating backwards. He took Trainor's pass at the blueline, partially over-shouldered the puck and turned around to backhand it into the corner of the Glace Bay cage.

Fyles evened the count four minutes later by whipping home a 20 footer. Saindon then scored two quick ones the first on a pass from Whitlock and the second on Trainor's rebound.

Merv Towers scored his first goal of the season at the 11:44 mark by tipping in Cecil Dowling's backhander and Fyles completed the scoring for the period by picking up a loose puck and drilling an angle shot past Bessette.

Early in the second period Ritchie took a pass from Towers and beat D'Aoust on an easy shot. Four minutes later Trainor set up Towers in front of the Glace Bay net for a pretty goal and at 13:22 Saindon and Whitlock combined for the smartest goal of the night with Saindon picking the corner on an almost impossible angle.

Orin Carver made it 8-2 early in the third session by scoring from close in after taking Dorrington's pass from a face-off in the Miners zone. Seventeen seconds later Trainor skated through the Glace Bay team to beat D'Aoust and then just before the end of the game the Islanders coach skated from end to end as he set up Carver in front of the cage for the final goal.

The Islanders might even have scored more than ten times had they been sharper around the net. The line of Whitlock, Saindon and Gray in particular had many scoring opportunities.

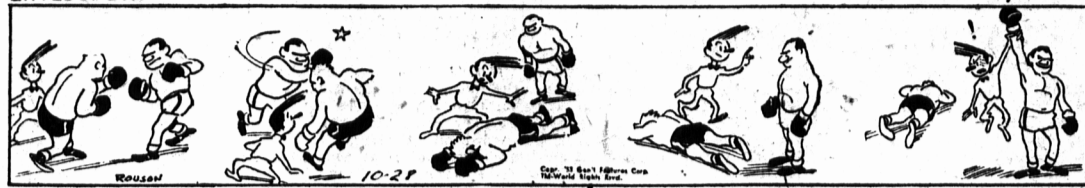
Jackie LeClair On Waiver List

The Islanders went on their first scoring spree of the season last night and made it a good one as they shellacked the Glace Bay Miners 10-2. In the line of Whitlock, Saindon and Gray the Islanders appear to have some atomic scoring power. Saindon may be the left winger that Whitlock has been looking for during the past two seasons although Charlie Holdaway did very well on Whitlock's port side last season. However, Saindon showed last night what he is taking second place to any leftwinger in this league as he appears to have everything he needs to have a banner year.

How the Miners licked the Islanders 8-0 Saturday night is one of the difficult questions to answer in hockey. Glace Bay coach Don Penniston thinks the travelling and the Monday night game in Halifax cut the efficiency of his team by fifty per cent. The Islanders themselves claim it's hard to play on the Glace Bay ice. The ice surface at the Bay is considerably larger than the rink and they claim the Bay forwards really like it. Offensively the Bay looks fairly good but they appear weak defensively.

Penniston is doing everything, he can to strengthen his club but claims it's difficult to secure players. "You can't go out and pick them up like leaves," he stated last night. "There are too many leagues around here and there aren't enough good players to go around. Ontario teams are going all out to win the Allan Cup and they have the bank rolls to work with. Most of the Ontario clubs are privately operated with the owners having loads of money to spend. Quite a number of them carry the name of money wolves took in about \$170,000 in thirty games."

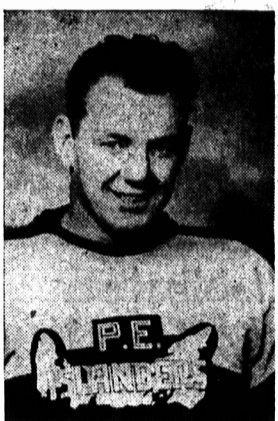
Penniston coached Shawinigan Falls in the Quebec League for part of last season. One of his players was Edwin Grosse whom he rates very highly. When Shawinigan disbanded this year Grosse was sold to the Quebec Aces by Detroit Red Wings for \$3,500. According to Penniston this is only a small figure for the Aces to pay when it comes to procuring a player. They will pay nearly any price to get what they want. And they can well afford it because they sell about 8,000 holding seats in their multi-million dollar arena each year.

The Glace Bay coach has a lot of master-minding experience behind him. He was coach at Hershey in the American Hockey League for five years during which time he won one championship and played in the finals for another. He coached the Montreal Royals for five years and won four championships and coached at Quebec for four years while winning two championships. He doesn't know about his chances of winning another championship this year. He expects things will be better when Kenny Watson joins the fold. Watson is now on his way to the Bay.

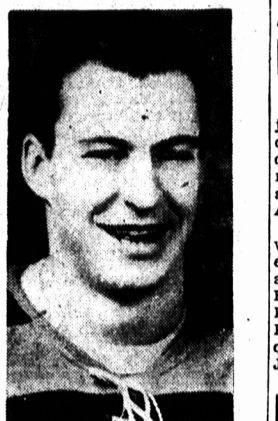

NEWMARKET, England, (AP) — Thirty-one horses are due to start today for the 11th Cambridgeshire Handicap, final glamor race of Britain's flat-racing season.

The mile-and-a-furlong race, on which an Irish sweepstake is based, is more for glory than gold for the owners. Win, place and show money totals only \$8,696 for first, \$937 for second, and \$478 for third.

For several weeks favoritism has bounced between Kithyra and Jupiter, with plenty of money going on "Choir Boy and Sailing Light. All odds have been long, even on the favorites.

Observers say there has never been such a betting spread for any other Cambridgeshire.

Four scratches in the last two days sliced the field for the second leg race of the autumn double. Peter Barty and Monty were re-imposed Tuesday. Penitent and Myrmidons were scratched Monday.

Jockey Ken Gethin rode Chantry to victory in the Cesarewitch stakes, first leg race on the double. His Cambridgeshire mount, King of the Tudors, will carry the money of many doubting players today.

No jockey, however, has ever ridden both winners of the autumn double.

An abundance of rain in the last month has helped the backing of Choir Boy, a fine four-year-old running in Queen Elizabeth's colors. Choir Boy likes a yielding turf.

Shoemaker Adds To His Laurels
ALBANY, Calif., (AP) — Willie Shoemaker added to his already extensive laurels Tuesday when he booted home comedian Lou Costello's Sea Bazooka in the second race at Golden Gate Fields for a record two-year total of 723 winners.

The previous mark for two consecutive years was the 722 racked up by Walter Miller in 1956 and 1957. Miller won 388 races in 1956 — which was a single year record for 46 years — and 334 and 1957. Shoemaker booted home 315 winners in 1952 and the one aboard Sea Bazooka Tuesday was number 408 of 1953. The former record for a single season was the 390 scored by Tony Despirito last year.

Jap Flyweight Retains Title
TOKYO, (AP) — World flyweight boxing champion, Yoshio Shirai of Japan, flicked and jabbed his way past the challenge of Cockney Terry Allen Monday night in a dismal 15-round title fight. The crowd of 30,000 yawned at the lack of action.

The two judges and the referee gave the decision to the handy champion over the London mite by a margin that, in Japan's complicated scoring system, was decisive. The champion weighed 110½ pounds, Allen the flyweight limit of 112. There was no blood, no knockdowns.

It was Allen's second unsuccessful attempt to regain boxing's smallest world crown. He held it briefly in 1950 before he dropped the title to Hawaii's Dado Marino. Shirai won it from Marino.

MONTEREAL, (CP) — Montreal's Junior Canadiens ran roughshod over the hapless Jonquiere Marquis Tuesday night, drubbing the northeastern Quebec entry 12-1 in a Quebec Junior Amateur Hockey Association game.

Claude Vinet paced the attack with three markers and Phil Goyette and Denis Bouchard got two apiece. Single goals came from Henri Richard, Ron Atwell, Forbes Kennedy (Charlottetown), Claude Provost and Andre Pronovost. Jonquiere's lone goal was scored by J. Rousseau.

Dressen Signs 3-Year Contract With Oakland
OAKLAND, Calif., (AP) — Chuck Dressen, who couldn't get a three-year contract from Brooklyn after leading the Dodgers to two National League pennants, signed Tuesday for that period of time with the Oakland baseball club of the Pacific Coast League.

Dressen said he had no regret at leaving the major leagues. "I will get just as much money here as I did back there and there will be a lot less grief," Dressen said.

Dressen said his salary would be \$32,500 a year, and he probably will be allowed to purchase stock in the club.
