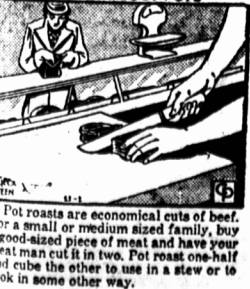

Warehouse On Montague Wharf Nears Completion

The new government warehouse on the Montague government wharf is almost completed and adds considerably to the shipping facilities provided. The shed, approximately 80 by 30 feet, is one large storage space finished inside and out with plywood. Both the floor and walls are completely insulated. The floor above the new concrete slab is insulated with a damp-resistant material above which is the matched-board flooring. The walls are insulated with fibre-glass and aluminum foil. Double doors completely seal off the draughts from that source. Three coats of paint have been provided to the exterior to give it a lasting finish. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

The workmen speedily removed the existing drainage pipes which were of little use, and have replaced them with a new system. Over this and along the whole length where the new sidewalk will be built, from D. M. MacDonald's residence to that of Mr. Arthur MacNeill, tons of clay fill have been placed and levelled. Some time will now be given for this to settle before actual construction of the sidewalk will get underway.
