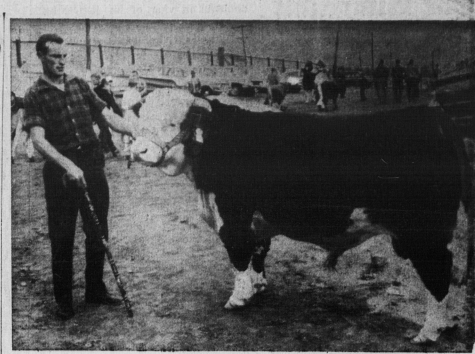


BLOOD DEFICIT Stands At 100

'Side Major' suggests Possible Visit By Queen

SUMMERSIDE — Mayor W. E. Jenkins indicated at Monday night's town council meeting that there is a good chance the Queen will visit here when she comes to Prince Edward Island in the fall.

He added that he had been in contact with people in "responsible positions on both sides of politics" and that they were too busy in making any public statements concerning the matter.

A special caucus meeting was held after the regular meeting to discuss tentative plans regarding her visit.

Town manager J. A. Brophy reported that the Canadian Memorial Fountain set in the vicinity of \$40,000, about \$50 less than originally anticipated, and commended the contracting firm of M.F. Schurman Company for both its interest in its free-of-charge alterations and improvements to the fountain. He was replying to a charge that the fountain project had cost the town as much as \$50,000.

Resolutions passed during the meeting included the acceptance of Curran and Briggs tender for street paving in the town. The firm was low bidder at \$61,618.

Low bidder M.F. Schurman Company was awarded the contract to make alterations for the Electric Department's new test house, with a total cost of \$520.

Working produced town authorization of a pipe crossing agreement at the CNR crossing on Myrtle Street, where a 14-inch sewer main is to be installed.

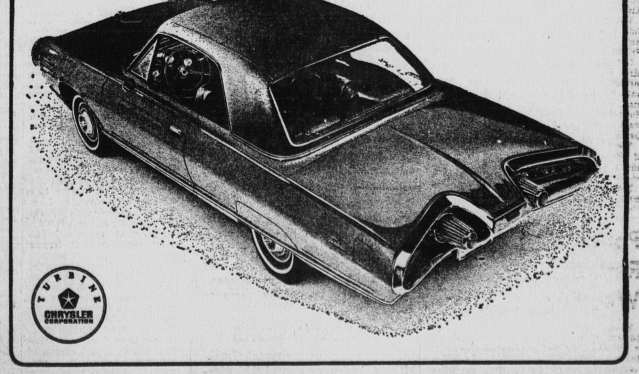
