Potato men from Tignish to the whole potato picture and R. C. Parent, superintendent, experimental farm at Charlottetown will discuss the marketing situation and if it must be approached as "an on the farm" problem.

Producers' production costs will be discussed in the afternoon by a panel that will include Mr. Goodwin, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae who will open the day's discussions at 9:30 a.m.; by several Island growers, Marketing Director Reid Stangster and Murray MacEwen, plant manager who will deal with the processing problem. Lincoln Dewar will head another panel on the question "Where do we go from here?" that will end an afternoon session that will also include a talk on "Methods more Economical Production" by Mr. Gallagher.

Jack Johnson, CBC Halifax, will link into "The Crystal Ball" for his guest speaker appearance during evening broadcast at 6 o'clock. A tour of the plant at New Annan beginning at 8 p.m. will wind up the program.

# S'ide Agrees To Accept Tax Installment Payments

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN  
A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening agreed to accept installment payments of tax arrears, and set Feb. 15 as the deadline for entering into a tax installment agreement with the town.

Tax defaulters at that date, who have not entered into an agreement setting out the terms of the installment payments, will be subject to action as provided by the Summerside Incorporation Act with respect to collection of taxes.

Installation payments in every case must not be less than \$20 per month, and payments as received will apply to the taxes longest in arrears.

Payment of each year's taxpayers will be applied first to such person's poll (educational) tax, if any; second, to the payment of motor vehicle tax, if any; third, to the payment of personal property (furniture) tax, and lastly, to real estate tax, if any.

The resolution approved by the council is to allow the payments by taxpayers of arrears of taxes by installments, "but definitely within the frame work of Section 138 of the Town of Summerside Incorporation Act".

This section, as described above, designates the order in which the tax will be applied. That is, to poll, motor vehicle, personal property, and real estate.
