Discipline for Boys.

Our enthusiastic and indefatigable friend, Rev. T. F. Fosterhill, St. John, has introduced into the city the organization referred to in the following paragraph:

A gentleman, in Glasgow, Scotland, had the happy thought to organize street Arabs into companies under military drill, and so bring them under moral and religious discipline. He began his work in 1885, and now has 423 companies, in which are enrolled 18,000 members under 1,370 officers. More than one-half of these are in Scotland. Professor Drummond is an enthusiastic believer in the organization. He says:

"Call these boys, boys, which they are, and ask them to sit up in a Sunday-class, and no power on earth will make them do it; but put a five-penny cap on them and call them soldiers, which they are not, and you can order them about till midnight. The genius who discovered this astounding and inexplicable psychological fact ought to rank with Sir Isaac Newton. As class, it was confusion, depression, demoralization, blasphemy, chaos. As a company, it is respect, self-respect, enthusiasm, happiness, peace. Boys love to march and drill, and this exercise not only secures attention, but promotes self-respect and courtesy. Every drill is opened and closed with prayer. In connection with the brigade are clubs for cricket, football, swimming and gymnastics.—P. Witness.

P. E. Island District Meeting.

The Temperance Movement in England.

A special meeting in connection with the National Temperance League was held yesterday at the Mansion House, London, under the presidency of the Lord Mayor to welcome a body of provincial mayors who are total abstainers. Among those present were the Bishop of London, the president of the League, Mr. Melnis, M. P., Mr. John Wilson, M. P., Messrs. John Layton, Samuel Dillon, M. R. Selway, George Williams, J. Seven Braithwaite, J. H. Raper, John Hilton, Ebenezer Clark, Robert Ray, (the secretary of the League), and the Mayors of Westham, Huddersfield, Rochdale, Stockport, Reading, Gloucester, Burslem, Batley, Crow, Heywood, Rochester, Boston, Evesham, Loughborough, Oswestry, Wilton, Faversham, Maidenhair, Devizes, Bideford, Andover, Malden, Evesham, and Henley-on-Thames.

Prayer having been offered by the Bishop of London, and after introductory remarks by the Lord Mayor, Lord Bishop stated that he was present in a double capacity—as president for some years of the National Temperance League which was doing a work of the very highest value to this country, and as the Bishop of the diocese. As a minister of religion, he felt that there was no part that he could take which was more important than that of doing his utmost to promote the great cause of temperance. They could not shut their eyes to the fact that what did the mischief was the enormous amount of temptation to which the people were subjected; and though he did not say that blame was to be altogether lifted from the shoulders of those who gave way to the temptation, he did maintain that the responsibility must be very largely shared by those who saw all the evil that was being done and yet took no steps whatever to interfere with it. He asked the meeting to give a hearty welcome to those who had come there that afternoon to show their adherence to a cause which was really more than anything else they could name, the cause of the poor. There was hardly anything short of the teaching of the gospel of Christ which could be put up by the side of the teaching of temperance principles. Short addresses were afterwards delivered by several of the mayors, and the proceedings closed with a vote of thanks to the Lord Mayor.—The Times.
