Dominion Exhibition!

Island Exhibits Still the Attraction.

The Opening Well Attended.

HALIFAX, Sept. 27.

A large number of exhibits arrived last night, but the Island contingent is yet the centre of attraction.

UNITED STATES.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 25.

The remains of the late President, which arrived yesterday afternoon from Washington, are now lying in state in Monumental Park, awaiting consignment to their final resting place to-morrow.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 25.

The rain which commenced falling about five p. m., continued for about half an hour. Just before the rain ceased an unusually bright rainbow became visible, its perfect lines being unbroken.

CLEVELAND, Sept. 25.

After the ceremonies at the park to-morrow the casket and dais will be put on the funeral car and conveyed to Lakeview cemetery to the vault where the body will be deposited.

SOMERS POINT, N. J., Sept. 25.

Schooner Hattie J., loaded with wood for New York, struck on Great Egg harbor bar, yesterday, and will be a total loss.

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.

A special report the destruction of fully one-half the business portion of Lawrence Village, Michigan, by fire. Loss \$310,000.

OTTAWA, Ill., Sept. 25.

Residences and manufactories covering

an area of six blocks, were destroyed by fire yesterday. Loss \$150,000 to \$200,000.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 25.

St. Paul's Cathedral was absolutely crammed this afternoon, it having been announced that the services would relate to the death of President Garfield, and a majority of the congregation were in mourning.

At both morning and evening services in Westminster Abbey reference was made to President Garfield's death. At all the principal churches of all denominations Gen. Garfield's death formed the subject of sympathetic allusion.

LONDON, Sept. 24.

A letter has been received from Henry M. Stanley, African explorer, dated Congo River, July 4, in which he says he was seriously sick, through the month of May so seriously that he gave, as he thought, his last orders to his European companions, but the crisis passed and he is now strong and hearty.

BOMBAY, Sept. 24.

A report received here states that Ayob Khan was defeated by the Amerer on the 22nd inst., and has fled to Herat, abandoning guns and baggage. The Amerer has not yet entered Candahar, but the city is defenceless.

LEEDS, Sept. 22.

The Mayor ordered a memorial organ recital to be given to-night, and invited the American consul. The Bishop of Liverpool sent a letter of condolence to the American consul.

MADRID, Sept. 25.

The Spanish Court will go into mourning for one year for the late President Garfield.
