It is reported that rich gold and silver bearing quartz has been struck in Kicking Horse Pass in the Selkirk Range, Manitoba. Specimens have been assayed which give \$90 to the ton.

THE Canadian Pacific Railway has now constructed 680 miles west of Winnipeg and is nearly all ballasted. Progress in laying the track is made at the rate of two and a half miles a day—notwithstanding the severe frost.

MR. ALBERT CARVELL, of the firm of Carvell Bros., returned from Boston this morning. While walking from the steamer "Worcester" to his home, he slipped on the glib ice and dislocated his ankle. We regret to learn that by the accident Mr. Carvell will be confined to his house for a few weeks.

WE are pleased to see that it is intended to despatch the steamer "Carroll" from Boston to make another trip to this port, on Saturday next. If the weather proves fine the coming of the "Carroll" will prove a great benefit to our shippers, as large quantities of produce are still awaiting shipment to the Boston market.

THE revenue at the Winnipeg Post Office from the sale of stamps this year was \$70,000, ranging third in the scale of cities of the Dominion; Toronto and Montreal being ahead. In the item of money orders, Winnipeg heads the list with \$600,000. Winnipeg issues nearly as many money orders as the cities of Toronto, Montreal, Halifax and Quebec put together.

PROFESSOR EASTY'S Lecture and Readings last evening were, taken as a whole, capital. For good reading Professor Easty said it is necessary (1) to understand thoroughly; (2) to enter into the spirit of the author; and (3) to be perfectly natural in manner and delivery. In illustration of the truth of these fundamental principles, the Professor's rendition of "Nicholas Nickleby," "The Wreck," "Tom's Little Star," and "A London Charity Dinner" was splendid. "Rest" and "Man was made to Mourn" were not so well done. But anyone who can appreciate the great difficulty of instantaneously changing the tone of one's mind from the extreme of the mirthful and the fanciful to the lowest notes of the grave and mournful, would wonder at the facility displayed by the Professor; and instead of finding fault, would take into consideration the restiveness and liveliness of the most youthful portions of the audience, which must have been, especially annoying to the reader.

True Bills.

DUBLIN, Dec. 5.

The Grand Jury have found a true bill against Patrick Higgins, Thomas Higgins, and Michael Flynn, who stand charged with the murder of the Huddys at Lough Mask. They have also found a true bill against the three men charged with the attempted assassination of Jurymen Field, and the attempted murder of Judge Lawson.

Collision—Another Steamer Lost.

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 6.

The Ailan Line Steamer "Peruvian," Capt. Joseph Ritchey, while entering the river Mersey, yesterday, collided with a steamer of the Clan Line bound for India. One of the steamers was cut to the water's edge, and sank on Crosby Beach. The passengers and crew were saved.

LONDON, Dec. 4.

The Daily News Constantinople correspondent says Dervish Pasha will be tried.

LONDON, Dec. 4.

The Queen opened new Courts of Justice, London, to-day with imposing ceremonies.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 4.

The Imperial family attended the fete of the Semiosky regiment of guards here yesterday.

BERLIN, Dec. 4.

The statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows an increase in specie of 9,840,000 marks.

DUBLIN, Dec. 4.

Mr. Healy was served with a summons last evening to appear in the Court of Queen's Bench on good behavior.

LONDON, Dec. 4.

The Daily News' Rome correspondent reports that the Pope has granted an audience to DeGiers, the Russian Minister.

HOUSTON, Dec. 4.

The total loss by the burning of the International Cotton Congress with 8,700 bales of cotton yesterday reaches \$500,000.

BERLIN, Dec. 4.

The mail bags containing official correspondence of Bismarck are reported missing and are thought to have been stolen.

A later despatch says they have been found.

COEK, Dec. 4.

Information will be applied for to-day against Mr. Redmond on account of his seditious speech delivered Nov. 21st, notwithstanding his absence on the Continent.

LONDON, Dec. 4.

The Times' St. Petersburg correspondent says it is circulated that embezzlement and robberies, private and official in Russia during the year, amount to 26,000,000 roubles.

LONDON, Dec. 4.

The Daily News' Cairo correspondent says that the Counsel for the defence stipulated that other chief prisoners participate in the compromise effected in the case of Arabi.

LONDON, Dec. 4.

The Standard's Constantinople correspondent says the Sultan did not attend the mosque on Friday, and it has since transpired that an attempt to assassinate him was contemplated. The Sultan is completely terror stricken and hardly dares to show himself outside the Harem.

LORDBURY, N. M., Dec. 4.

Last night the south bound coach was stopped by two Mexicans near Yar's Rancho. The robbers took the mail sack from the driver. They then disarmed the driver and ordered two Chinese passengers out of the coach after taking from them everything of value. They were then foully murdered.

LONDON, Dec. 4.

The family of the late Archbishop of Canterbury have declined the offer of burial of the Archbishop's body in Westminster Abbey. The remains will be buried in the family vault at Addington.

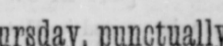

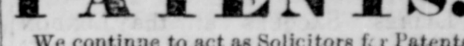
