Look For Plenty Action In Islanders-St. Mary's Game At Forum Tonight

The Charlottetown Forum will be the scene of renewed Maritime Senior Hockey League action tonight when the two top teams in the Big Four circuit, Charlottetown Islanders and Halifax Saint Mary's will clash there at 8:30.

With improved weather conditions expected today, Halifax officials informed the Islanders executive yesterday that they will be here at full strength for tonight's game starting time.

Whitlock Scores Winning Goal As Beavers Edge Moncton Hawks 4 To 3

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 1 — (CP)—Buck Whitlock, held scoreless earlier, sank the winning goal with one minute and 47 seconds remaining to give Saint John Beavers a 4-3 win over Moncton Hawks here tonight in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

It was the only game scheduled in the loop with the Charlottetown at Halifax fixture postponed due to icy road conditions and poor flying weather. Charlottetown holds a 19-point margin over Halifax for top position and Saint John is seven points behind Halifax. Moncton is 23 points off the pace behind Saint John.

Whitlock, the league's scoring leader, banged in Nick Nicolie's rebound after goalie Les Colvin stopped Jackie Thaler's shot for the winning marker. After Colvin made two stops, Whitlock practically the open net to sink the winner.

Chamberlain Seeks Moncton Hockey Franchise

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 1 — (CP)—The committee in charge of Moncton's civic-owned Stadium tonight revealed it has received an inquiry from Murph Chamberlain, coach of Vancouver Canucks of the Pacific Coast League, regarding possibility of obtaining the hockey franchise of the rink for next season.

Chamberlain, former National Hockey League star and earlier this season coach of Charlottetown Islanders of the Maritime Major Hockey League, addressed his inquiry to Harold (Dud) James, Stadium manager. It was read at tonight's meeting of the committee.

The committee asked James to inform Chamberlain of the method and conditions under which hockey is operated in the Stadium.

Chamberlain first attained prominence as a hockey coach when he piloted Sydney Millionaires to the first round of the Allan Cup playoffs last spring in his first season as a coach. He returned to the Maritimes last fall and organized Charlottetown Islanders, new entry in the Maritime loop but left the team shortly before Christmas to take over Vancouver Canucks.

75th Anniversary Today Of National Ball League

NEW YORK, Feb. 1 — (AP)—Baseball celebrates the National League's 75th anniversary tomorrow with the Happy Chandler problem still hanging first to be no solution to the Commissioner Chandler puzzle during the weekend. Apparently neither side is eager to make the first move. But with all 16 owners in town for the birthday party, separate league meetings Saturday and New York writers' dinner Sunday, anything can happen.

What to do about Happy? Force him out? Let him serve out his term? Re-elect him? Name a new commissioner?

Ever since the December night at St. Petersburg when the owners repudiated Chandler they have tussled with these questions behind closed doors.

Each league named two men to a committee that was to sift in a candidate for successor. Del Webb of New York Yankees, Ellis Ryan of Cleveland, Phil Wrigley of Chicago Cubs and Lou Perini of Boston Braves were the men. They were to report at the February meetings. But no joint meeting is scheduled. Chandler, due to speak at the writers' dinner, may drag the matter into the open.

It probably is safe to assume that the committee will report informally to the owners. There is no indication that it has reached any decision. In fact, there are reports that Chandler, who had nine votes in Florida has picked up one or two more in the interim. Twelve votes are necessary for election.

President Ford Frick has made elaborate plans for the National League birthday ceremony at the Broadway Central Hotel in downtown Manhattan where the League was organized Feb. 2, 1876.

Some 16 Hall of Fame members, including the 1951 duo of Mel Ott and Jimmy Foxx, are due to participate.

Ott will speak on behalf of his Hall of Fame colleagues after their introduction.
