

New Out Of Work Benefits To Take Effect In November

OTTAWA (CP)—Changes in unemployment insurance benefits, approved by Parliament in July, will take effect in November at the onset of the cold weather season which brings Canada its annual peak of unemployment.

The government plans to have the new legislation formally proclaimed Oct. 2 but it will be about eight weeks later before jobless workers will feel the change in terms of the amount of insurance they draw.

The legislation, which generally overhauls the 15-year-old Unemployment Insurance Act, will raise to \$30 a week from the present \$24 the amount of insurance an unemployed married person in the top wage category may draw. For single unemployed the ceiling will rise to \$23 from \$17.10.

Another major change will be reduction of the maximum length of benefit to 36 weeks from the present 51.

Present plans are that workers will start to collect higher benefits if they become unemployed eight weeks after making payments into the \$880,000,000 unemployment insurance fund from Oct. 2 on. On that date Governor-General Massey is scheduled to proclaim the bill—a formality that will translate it into law.

No one was more anxious to start work before the cameras than Judy Garland. Much had happened to her in the interlude between film roles. During this interlude she had married, had a baby, and made a personal appearance tour in Great Britain and the United States.

The tour was a fabulous success and proved to the Hollywood professionals that Judy's "freshness" was as great an attraction as Judy on film. And Judy's characteristic of her acting artistry, as was potent with live audiences, as with motion picture audiences.

She had done no stage work of importance during her long film reign. The last time was when she sang and danced in vaudeville theaters at age 11 as one of the Gumm Sisters trio. Yet she had enough talent and ability to play for 19 S.R.O. weeks at the big New York Palace theater.

She touched the emotions of Edinburgh, Scotland, audiences so happily that, at her final performance at the Empire theater, they stood up and sang "Auld Lang Syne" while Judy lingered in the spotlight and alternately cried and blew kisses.
