ANSWER: From experience with many friends in like positions, I can offer little hope that your husband will ever willingly give up the Merchant Marine for a shore job. The hundreds of books that have been written about man's love for the sea are not exaggerations. There is something about a seafaring life that holds a man firmly. Of course your husband's duty is to, and with his family, but only the Delphic Oracle could tell you how to convince him of it. If he hasn't been used to working on shore, he would undoubtedly have to take a job at less pay, and after sailing the seven seas, riding a subway or bus will be pretty tame to him.

ceded its powers," the Senator replied. "It's been passed on by this court," Mr. Varcoe interposed. Mr. Varcoe described Senator Farris' reference to "centralization" as an "emotional observation." "This is decentralization," he said, "because you would have a body sitting in Charlottetown regulating the potato trade." He also attacked Senator Farris' idea that there would have to be separately appointed boards, though they might have the same personnel, for provincial and inter-provincial trade. "The whole purpose of the legislation," he said, "was to invest power in a single board, not two acting side by side. That is the vital aspect of the whole scheme."

Public Affairs Reviewed By Senior Queen's Member

Public affairs are reviewed in the following address by Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, M.P. for Queen's, which is scheduled for broadcast delivery this evening in place of an address by Mr. Frank Stanfield, Conservative member for Colchester-Hants, which has had to be postponed. After paying tribute to Mr. Stanfield's ability, Mr. McLure said: "In these days no report from Ottawa would be complete without reference to the national calamity which has been visited on us through the epidemic of hoof-and-mouth disease in Saskatchewan.

"This dread, cattle disease has come from no one knows where, to strike at the herds on the Prairies. Serious as the loss of livestock actually slaughtered is, it is only a fraction of the immense damage to our economy caused by the loss of our livestock markets in the United States. "Our only course at present, in my opinion, is to give our veterinarians and technicians a free rein in their efforts to check and eventually stamp out this scourge. "Many of us here in Ottawa and elsewhere, after hearing some details about the outbreaks of this disease, have the feeling that—in the words of Tennyson's poem formerly in the school readers—"Someone had blundered."

Seeking Information "But this is no time for fault-finding, nor is it any intention of mine to find fault. What we are asking for in the House of Commons and the Agriculture Committee is information. What we are seeking is not faults but facts. We are not looking for a scapegoat for this epidemic. We are looking for facts through which we may gain greater knowledge and find ourselves better equipped to combat this frightful malady. "I do not say that our veterinary people and livestock experts are not competent to deal with this crisis. I do not sit in judg-

"THE HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT"

REGULATIONS re DEALERS' LICENSES made under the provisions of Section 106 of "The Highway Traffic Act", being Chapter 73 of the Revised Statutes of Prince Edward Island, 1951

Approved by His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council on the 17th day of April, 1952.

1. In these Regulations "Dealer" means every person other than a salesman who carries on or conducts, either for the whole or part of his time, the business of buying, selling or dealing in motor vehicles.

2. Dealers shall be classified as follows: New Car Dealers; Sub-Dealers and Used Car Dealers.

REQUIREMENTS AS TO LICENSING AS NEW CAR DEALER

3. (1) The sale and servicing of new and used vehicles must be the principal business of the applicant. (2) Premises must be maintained adequate to show, service and repair at one time at least five motor vehicles of standard size. (3) The dealer must be or employ at least one qualified mechanic. (4) He must have a bookkeeping system and records adequate to provide information giving full data on all vehicles sold or held for sale or repair. (5) The applicant must, in addition to the deposits necessary for use of temporary registrations, make a deposit of \$200.00 to accompany his application and to be forfeited if gross irregularities in connection with registration are made by him or his authorized agents. (6) As a prerequisite to issuance of a provincial license, the applicant must provide a Certificate of Franchise from the manufacturer for whom he is an outlet, which shall set out the selling territory assigned to him.

REQUIREMENTS AS TO LICENSING AS A SUB-DEALER

4. (1) The applicant must provide a certificate from the licensed dealer from whom he buys new or used vehicles for resale. (2) Suitable premises must be maintained adequate to show, service and repair at one time at least two motor vehicles of standard size. (3) The applicant must be or employ at least one qualified mechanic. (4) He must have a bookkeeping system and records adequate to provide information giving full data on all vehicles sold or held for sale or repair. (5) The applicant must, in addition to the deposits necessary for use of temporary registrations, make a deposit of \$100.00 to accompany his application and to be forfeited if gross irregularities in connection with registrations are made by him or his authorized agents.

REQUIREMENTS FOR LICENSING AS USED CAR DEALER

5. (1) The selling and servicing of used vehicles must be the principal business of the applicant. (2) Suitable premises must be maintained adequate to servicing and repairing at one time at least three motor vehicles of standard size. (3) The applicant must be or employ at least one qualified mechanic. (4) He must have a bookkeeping system and records adequate to provide information giving full data on all vehicles sold or held for sale or repair. (5) The applicant must, in addition to the deposits necessary for use of temporary registrations make a deposit of \$200.00 to accompany his application, and to be forfeited if gross irregularities in connection with registrations are made by him or his authorized agents. (6) Applicant must provide at least one character and one business reference as to ability to operate a used car business.
