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The Souris Affair.

SECOND INQUEST ON THE BODY OF JOSEPH STROPLE—THE VERDICT.

OWING to the fact that no evidence was obtained at the first inquest on the body of Joseph Strople to show what was the cause of his death, beyond that he was seen to fall over the bank of the shore of Colville Bay...

The body was disinterred at Souris West on Saturday last, and a post mortem performed by Dr. McLeod, of Charlottetown, assisted by Dr. Walsh, of Mount Stewart.

The Rev. F. L. Patt, a young Episcopalian clergyman, of Greenwich, Conn., who went out to China about a year ago, has married Miss S. N. Wong, who was the first Chinese convert to Christianity.

Besides doing journalistic work Mr. Campbell has written several dramas, among which may be mentioned "Castaway," "The Broken Heart," "Jack of Hearts," "A Bachelor's Divorce," "Unlucky Thirteen," and "Queen of Diamonds," and is also a very successful comedian and stage director.

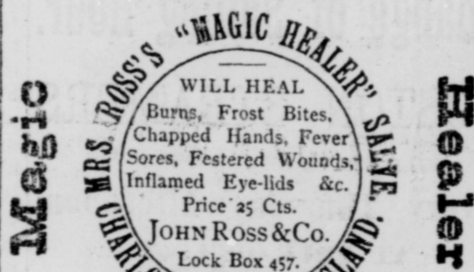
