SUSSEX, N. B., July 26—The largest Gilwell Camp for the training of Scout masters ever held in the Maritime Provinces opened on the grounds of the Sussex Scout Camp, Deer Lodge, about five miles from here yesterday. Attending the camp are 42 young men, interested in Scouting, and eager to learn more of Scout lore.
