

Parkdale Nips Youth Club 6-5

Allie Carver's Overtime Marker Decides Thriller

Parkdale coach Allie Carver's second goal of the game at 18 minutes of the overtime period gave the Parkdale Flyers a 6-5 victory over Basilia Youth Club in a thrill-packed game at the Sports Arena last night.

With nearly 1200 spectators looking on, Carver opened the overtime period with a pass to Allie Carver who fired a shot into the net. The Flyers were holding a commanding 5-1 lead but the youth club started a drive that netted them four straight goals to send the game into overtime.

The victory gave the Flyers a 2-1 edge in the best-of-seven semi-final series.

TWO IN FIRST

The Flyers started away with two goals in the first six minutes of the opening period. They led from 3-0 in the second before the youth club could get a spot on the scoresheet. The Flyers got that one back to lead 4-1 going into the third.

Allie Carver and speedy right winger Jim MacLeod fired two goals for the Flyers. Ralph Josey and Bob Hurry contributed the others.

Only six penalties were called by referees Leith Jay and Moe Goodwin. Four went to the Flyers and all were minors.

GOALIES BRILLIANT

Both goalkeepers, Frank Roper of the Flyers and Thane Doyle of the youth club, played brilliantly. Roper had his toughest stops in a furious first when the youth club peppered him with 13 drives. Frank stopped all of them. In the second Doyle handled 13 of 15 drives and didn't have a hope on the two goals that beat him.

A great solo rush by G. B. Y. C. defenseman Art Perry, sent the game into overtime with only 43 seconds left to play in the third period. Perry started from his own end, stickkicked his way to the Parkdale defense and, as he was cutting in his left hand, he caught the short side with a backhand.

MACLEOD NETS FIRST

It took the Flyers only 5 minutes and 33 seconds to run up a 2-0 lead. Jim MacLeod got the first when he took Alan MacLeod's blue line pass and fired a high hard shot. Doyle got his glove on it but it bounced into the corner of the net. Josey got the second when his drive from the blue line hit Frank Shepherd and deflected by Doyle.

MacLeod was back for his second at 14:18 of the second period. Hard working Willie Dunn eased a pass from the corner in front of the youth club net and MacLeod was on the right spot to bang it home.

Squarebriggs got the youth club's elubbers back in the game 10 minutes later when he sallied in to the clear after taking Howatt's return pass at the Parkdale line. Roper made a nice try at a save but Squarebriggs eased the puck between his legs.

Skip Carver engineered a pretty play for Parkdale's fourth goal. He carried the puck from his own end, hit Bob Hurry with a pass at the goalmouth. Hurry made no mistake.

When Allie Carver picked up brother Orin's pass at 3:43 of the third to give the Flyers a big 5-1 spread, most of the fans were having thoughts about heading for the exits. However, less than two minutes later Johnny Squarebriggs batted in Arnold Mullins' rebound to put the B.Y.C. back in the game.

When Ralph Josey was handed a tripping penalty at 8:02 the Youth Club really turned on the heat. They buzzed around the Parkdale net for almost the entire two minutes. Josey was just getting set to step back on when Merrill Pincus rifled home Whitlock's pass and 48 seconds later Spy Ready came flying in on the left wing to drive one home on the far side.

Perry tied it up in the last minute and Allie Carver, with 6 minutes and 20 seconds gone in the overtime, took brother Skip's pass in front of the B.Y.C. net and flipped it into a corner, after deking Doyle into making the first move.

CHATTER . . . Allie Carver suffered a nasty cut over his left eye in the second when he and Frank Shepherd clashed along the boards. . . Shepherd also came out of the collision requiring stitches with a cut on the back of his head. . . Bob Hurry was injured in the collision. . . Last night's crowd was the biggest in weeks. . . Big \$132,500 Pot Up For Grabs In National Loop

MONTREAL (CP) — There's a big pot of \$132,500 up for grabs among National Hockey League players—those good enough and fortunate enough to share in the distribution.

From the way things are going in the close finish, most of the hopefuls for this end-of-season wealth won't be known until the Stanley Cup playoffs are over.

The general distribution is this way:

\$36,000 in graduated scale among the clubs holding the first four positions at the end of the regular NHL season;

\$81,000 in Stanley Cup playoffs, both semi-finals and final;

\$6,500 for individual awards; a \$9,000 for the 12 players making the all-star teams.

BIG BONUS POSSIBLE

In the scramble for the extra money it still is possible for an outstanding player to walk off with \$6,000.

For the finishing places in the league race and for the playoffs, the NHL sets up 18 units.

The club finishing first will get \$18,000, an average of about \$1,000 for each player. On the same basis, player on the second-place club will get \$500 each, those on the third-place club \$350 and those on the fourth-place club \$150.

On the same unit basis, each player on the winning teams in the cup semi-finals will get \$10,000; on the losing teams, \$500. The same monetary awards go to players on the winning and losing teams in the final.

There are six individual awards four of them decided by hockey writers, broadcasters and telecasters in the six NHL cities.

TROPHIES PLUS CASH

Two of the awards are won on the basis of achievement as shown in the final statistics. To the leading scorer—total of goals and assists—goes \$1,000; to the runner-up, \$500. The winner also gets the Ross Trophy.

The Vezina Trophy and \$1,000 goes to the goalie who played the most games during the season for the team least scored upon.

The voted awards, with \$1,000 in cash each, are the Hart Trophy, for most valuable player to his team; the Byng Trophy, for the player combining good conduct with playing ability; the Norris Trophy, for the league's best defenceman, and the Calder Trophy, for the outstanding rookie.

The voters also decide the all-star teams. Six players named to the first team get \$1,000 each; those on the second team \$500.
