

**Funeral Yesterday  
Of L.A.C. MacKay**



The funeral of the late L.A.C. Clive Milton MacKay was held yesterday afternoon from Zion Presbyterian Church where services were conducted by Rev. Harold Brown and F.L.E. R. C. Christmas, Chaplain at the R. C. A. F. Station Summerside. Hymns sung were "What A Friend We Have In Jesus", and "Nearer My God To Thee". During the service Mrs. N. D. MacLean sang solo, "The Old Rugged Cross." Pall bearers were Sam Robinson, Wally Higgins, Walter MacNeill, Norman Nicholson, H. E. Carmichael, Carlyle MacDougal. A firing party from the R.C.A.F. fired three volleys over the grave after which the Last Post was sounded. The office staff of the C.N.R. attended in a body, as did the members of the I.O.O.F. whose graveside service was conducted by E. H. Cauty and Finley MacKinnon.

The late L.A.C. MacKay was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh MacKay, 22 Grant Street, and was well and favorably known. He passed away at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Sunday, October 23, after a comparatively short illness at the age of twenty-eight. Last July he and his wife the former Jean Coffin, of Rollo Bay and their 15-month-old daughter, Deborah Anne spent a month on the Island visiting their parents. It was shortly after his return to Rivers, Manitoba that he became ill and was obliged to enter hospital there. When it was seen that his condition was worsening and that little hope could be entertained for his recovery, the air force gave him a compassionate posting to Summerside. He was sent to the Prince Edward Island Hospital but returned to his father's home for a short time. He was obliged to re-enter hospital a week ago last Wednesday.

The late L.A.C. MacKay attended West Kent School and Union Commercial College. He became employed in the Canadian National freight office and for a time worked in the dispatcher's office. In 1951 he was given leave of absence from the Railroad to join the Air Force in which he served at Camp Borden and Rivers, Manitoba.

Besides his father and mother, his wife and young daughter, he is survived by a brother Ralph, a sergeant in the U.S. Army, stationed at New York City and a veteran of six years in the Canadian Army. Mr. Hugh MacKay, father of the late airman is a veteran of both World Wars.

**EVIDENCE GIVEN BY ACCUSED  
IN LOCAL MANSLAUGHTER HEARING**

The preliminary hearing of John Francis Cecil Molyneux charged with manslaughter was continued before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet at the Court House in Charlottetown yesterday and following the hearing of the evidence of the accused, was further adjourned for one week. Mr. J. P. Nicholson represented the Crown. Counsel for the accused was R. R. Bell, Q.C.

The charge arose from the result of the findings at the inquest at which the jury reported

that "John Joseph McKenna came to his death on Sept. 27, 1954 on the Prince Nova while enroute to Camp Hill Hospital, Halifax as a result of head injuries, Sept. 15, 1954, at Roy Molyneux's farm, Bradalbane, when engaged in fighting with Cecil Molyneux." Thirteen witnesses were examined at the preliminary hearing, ten of whom had testified during the inquest.

The only evidence given yesterday was by the accused, who when asked by his counsel, R. R. Bell, Q.C., to describe the events leading up to the fight he had with the deceased on Sept. 15, said the first intimation he had of visitors to his home was when he went to get on his tractor to go after another load of grain which they were threshing. He saw a truck in yard, but did not recognize it. Went into the house where he met Emmett Noonan, Wallace McKenna and J. J. McKenna. The McKennas were never at the home before. They were drinking rum, glasses and sugar being on the table. Wallace McKenna and accused sat and chatted. J. J. McKenna and Noonan walked about the kitchen; one could easily tell they were drinking.

The deceased was over six feet
