New High School For Kensington

A special meeting of the Kensington school district last night with more than 75 rate payers present, decided almost unanimously to build a new 6-room high school, which will be of brick construction, and will include an auditorium, lab and kitchen facilities.

The building will accommodate grades 9 to 12 inclusive, and will relieve congestion in the present school. It is expected that an increased number of pupils in those grades from the surrounding rural districts will take advantage of the improved facilities.

Mr. Austin Pendergast acting as chairman of last night's meeting, and an orderly discussion was held on the size and type of construction, possible site, and available assistance from the government.

The board of trustees, Messrs. Pendergast, Ron Kennedy and Roy MacArthur, presented the information obtained on these questions.

On a motion which carried by a large majority, \$50,000 was voted by the district to cover the cost, and the trustees were authorized to borrow money and proceed with the arrangements for construction by contract.

A letter was read to the meeting from the Kensington Community Club stating that they intended to contribute \$5,000 towards the auditorium.

After a short discussion on how to give suitable recognition to possible memorial grants from private citizens, the meeting adjourned.

It is hoped by those in charge of the project that the building will be completed in time for opening at the fall term of school this year.

When Mr. Pillman again declined to answer, Magistrate Hinton stated that he was not co-operating with the administration of justice and instructed that he must answer the question or be held in contempt of court.

At this point that Mr. Campbell introduced argument which contended that Magistrate Hinton did not have authority to charge contempt, and after considerable discussion the witness stood down subject to recall, and the court announced that a clarification of this matter would be sought before hearing on this charge is continued.

The case against Simmons and MacFarlane consists of three charges: (1) Not having a dealer's license; (2) Not having a producer's license; and (3) Receiving potatoes from unlicensed producers.

Mr. Pillman was the fourth witness to refuse to answer questions on grounds of self-incrimination during these hearings, the others being Messrs. James MacDougall, Ralph Monkley and Therin Simmons, who had been stood down pending a ruling by the Magistrate on whether they could be compelled to answer the questions asked by counsel for the prosecution.

Burglars Fail To Crack Safe In Summerside

Shortly after midnight yesterday morning intruders, believed to be juveniles, fled when disturbed in their efforts to break into the office safe in the Crystal Service Station operated by William Corney on Water Street West in Summerside.

Entry to the building was made by smashing away the covering over a broken window in the rear of the garage section of the service station, and from here the office was entered by smashing out a window.

A frontal assault with a chain or bolt cutters succeeded only in cutting off the top of the hinges and damage to the door handle and the combination dial to the extent that the safe cannot now be opened except by acetylene torch or electric drill.

Before closing the service station about 10 o'clock Joe Calbeck an employee at the station had removed all the cash from the register which had been left open on top of the safe. The break was discovered about two hours later by Leo Gallant and Antonio Gallant who had made arrangements to leave a truck overnight in the service station garage.

It is thought that the intruders were probably in the office when the men arrived with the truck, and that a slight delay in opening the garage door, occasioned by a bicycle which had been left leaning against the door, gave the attempted safe-breakers the opportunity to make their escape through the rear window.
