

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

OTTAWA, July 6. Latest reports from Manitoba announce that Dr. Schultz is elected by 130 majority. A private telegram from Dr. Schultz himself confirms the report. The two remaining divisions are not yet fully determined. Allowing them as claimed yesterday, the result in Manitoba will be the return of three Government supporters, one Briton and one independent, as follows: Winnipeg—Scott, Lib.-Con., 106 majority. Provencher—Hon. Jas. Royal, Lib.-Con., acclamation. Lisgar—Hon. Dr. Schultz, Lib.-Con., 130 majority. Marquette—Watson, Manitoba First Candidate, 111 majority. Selkirk—Sutherland, grit, 67 majority. Watson, of Marquette, will give the Government an independent support.

LONDON, July 6. A despatch to the Times from Alexandria states that Admiral Seymour has sent an ultimatum to the authorities demanding the instant stoppage of the construction of earthworks under threat of opening fire. The work has ceased for the moment.

ALEXANDRIA, July 6. Despite all denials to the contrary, work on the fortifications continues. Admiral Seymour delays formally demanding the cessation of work until all British residents are on board the vessels in the harbor. They are now hastily embarking.

PARIS, July 6. The Cabinet has considered instructions to be given to Admiral Conrad, commander of the French fleet, in view of the possibility of the English fleet bombarding the defenses at Alexandria. It is understood that they decided he shall remain passive, and only participate if provoked by some act or incident.

SIMLA, July 6. Sir Herbert Macpherson will have chief command of the force sent from India to Egypt.

MADRID, July 6. The Government has received a despatch from Alexandria asserting that Egyptian bands have attempted to cut the Suez Canal.

ALEXANDRIA, July 6—Midnight. Admiral Seymour has received a reply to his ultimatum stating that the report as to work upon the batteries and forts is not true.

LONDON, July 7. A telegram from a correspondent at Alexandria, says that the answer of Arabi Pasha does not satisfy Admiral Seymour, who has sent out a call on all English warships. The French encourage Arabi Pasha to resist.

LONDON, July 6. In the Commons, to-night, John Bright supported a motion to go into committee on the arrears bill. After several speeches, Parnell announced that his party did not intend further to oppose the Repeal Bill. The House went into committee on the Arrears Bill and at 2.15 reported progress.

PHILADELPHIA, July 6. The Medical News to-morrow will publish an official report of the autopsy upon Guitéau's brain. In a long editorial, the Medical News says: From the report it must appear that those who expected to demonstrate the assassin's criminal irresponsibility by charges in his brain will have a difficult task. Some deviations from a typical normal brain are referred to in the report, but they have absolutely no significance from the point of view of mental derangement.

A Maritime Conference has concluded to seek in England five young men for our ministry. On the subject of ministerial recruits an exchange has these words, which are timely: "Now pastors drop out of their work, or go upward to reward. Is the church sure of filling their places? We say: 'God buries his workmen, but carries on His work.' At the same time, we can and may do all possible to keep the ranks full of devout, devoted men. Do we stimulate the boys to look to the ministry? Do we so prompt our own boys? Do we implant the idea sufficiently deep among young men in our church institutions? Do we reserve enough room for young recruits, and do we never displace them unless by accepting older men of insufficient if not actually deficient outfit? Far from being 'crowded,' all work in all churches is crying out for strong, efficient, godly workers."—Provincial Wesleyan.

TO ESTIMATE AMOUNT OF LAND IN DIFFERENT FIELDS. To aid farmers in arriving at accuracy in estimating the amount of land in different fields under cultivation, the following plan is given:—Five yards wide by 963 long contains one acre. Ten yards wide by 481 long contains one acre. Twenty yards wide by 240 long contains one acre. Seventy yards wide by 69 long contains one acre. Eighty yards wide by 60 long contains one acre. Sixty feet wide by 726 long contains one acre. One hundred and thirty feet wide by 363 long contains one acre. Four hundred and forty feet wide by 99 long contains one acre.

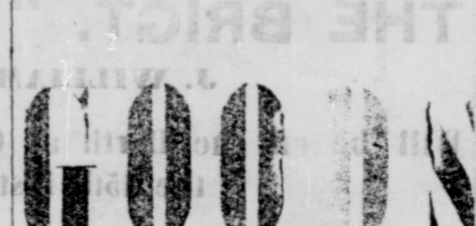
