

RCMP Corporal Wins Top Honors At Provincial Rifle Association Meet

Corporal W. M. Beatty of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Summerside won the Grand Aggregate and the Ottawa Aggregate at the Provincial Rifle Association Meet which concluded yesterday on the Squaw Point Range.

Corporal Beatty, who was also last year's winner of the Grand and Ottawa Aggregates, posted a score of 524 for the Grand Aggregate and 638 in the Ottawa Ag.

Gunner C. C. Strong was runner-up in the Grand Aggregate with a score of 521 while Cpl. A. M. Johnston of the R.C.M.P. was runner-up in the Ottawa Aggregate with a score of 635.

Capt. E. R. Burke yesterday won the Jones Memorial Match with a score of 168. Sub-Lieut. T. F. Baines won the United Services Officers Club Match with a score of 186.

The presentation of trophies, medals, prizes and other awards featured the annual dinner of the Provincial Rifle Association held at Sandy's last night. Brig. W. W. Reid presided and following an excellent dinner made a few brief remarks before introducing chairman of the council George J. Rogers.

Mr. Rogers in presenting the awards to the winners briefly congratulated them on the showing during the various shoots. Approximately 60 riflemen were present.

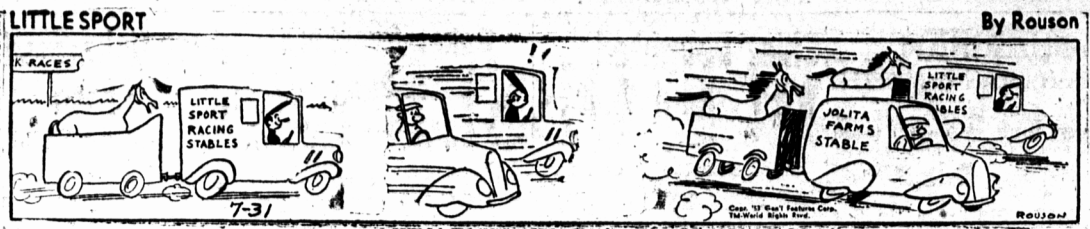
